CROP CONDITIONS

AROUND IRVING

Potatoes May Be Light Crop on Ac-
count of Gophers—Making New
Homes in River Bottom.

As far as the crop of potatoes near
Irving is concerned, prices will be as
high next winter as the last, for the
early potatoes have been a rather
poor crop on account of damage by
gophers, and the late ones do not
promise, according to present reports,
any immense yields for that district.
The gophers do not eat the potatoes
themselves, but seem to have a liking
for the stems between the potatoes
and the vine. When these are cut
the tuber does not develop to its us-
ual size.

The chief method which has been
used in fighting the pest has been by
shooting, which is sometimes very ef-
fective.

Hops in the same vicinity are doing
well, where they have been taken
care of, but owing to the high price
of labor many growers have deemed
it cheaper to neglect their yards, and
there will not be a good yield every-
where. Lice have also appeared very
thickly and spraying has begun in
the fight against that pest.

The country along the river be-
tween Eugene and Irving has become
a community of small farms of ten
and twenty acre properties. There
is a great deal of fruit and vegeta-
bles planted in the district, nearly
everything producing especially well.
Down near the mouth of the McKen-
zie, even where during great floods
the land is covered with water, twenty
families have bought homes and
are clearing the very finest river bot-
tom soil of heavy timber and brush.
Six years ago there were very few
houses in this place.

MAY ABANDON PART OF WOODBURN BRANCH

There is a persistent report that
the Woodburn-Natron road from the
Tallman Junction to Shelburn will be
torn up. The road south of Crabtree
to the junction has not been used for
some time on account of the impos-
sibility of securing a bridge that will
stand. If this is done it is said that
the train which now runs between
Woodburn and Crabtree will come to
Albany, making that city the south-
ern terminus. Trains already run be-
tween Springfield and Albany, giving
a good service. As the Southern Pa-
cific owns both roads, the report has
something to found it on.

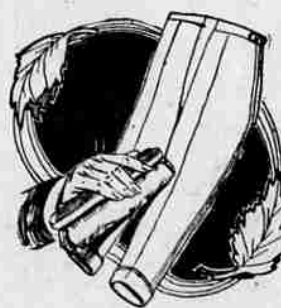
