CARVER WILL BUILD NEW ROAD INTO BENTON COUNTY

Corvallis, Or., July 16.—It is given out here that 25 miles of a railroad running from Corvallis southwest along the foothills is to be built this autumn, work to begin as soon as the surveys can be completed and right-of-way secured. The initial equipment of steel rails, comprising four miles, is now in transit to Corvallis over the West Side line of the Southern Pacific. An additional six miles are in Portland, and in all 15 miles of the route are en route. Surveyors have been in the field four weeks, and are now operating near Corvallis.

The destination of the line is Blachley, in what is known as the Lake Creek country, on the headwaters of the Siuslaw. The road will be 25 miles long, and the announcement is that it will be completed next spring. It taps 3,000,000,000 feet of standing timber en route, and traverses the finest agricultural section of Benton county. In the Lake Creek country it opens the finest dairy region along the coast.

Stephen Carver, who built the 16-mile railroad from Ontario to Vale, is in the enterprise. Corvallis and vicinity subscribed \$20,000 in stock. The estimated cost of the first 25 miles, or that section stretching from Corvallis to the head of the Alsea river, is \$25,000, or \$900 a mile. The road is to be standard gauge, and for the present will be of steam motive power. The country through which the road is to pass is very level, making construction comparatively inexpensive.

The negotiations between Mr. Carver and the Corvallis Commercial Club, through which the stock was sold, have been carried on with the utmost secrecy, and it was not until today that the facts were given out. The offer of Mr. Carver was made to the club a week ago, and after six days' work the committee from the club reported last Saturday night that the stock had been subscribed. Since that time the committee has been at work preparing articles of incorporation, which have been sent to the secretary of state.

The road to be known as the Corvallis & Alsea River Railway will run south from Corvallis, skirting the foothills, through Bellfountain, thence southwesterly, touching the headwaters of the Alsea and on to Blachley. The country is rich in agricultural, dairying and timber resources. Mr. Carver is also interested in building a line from Corvallis to the coast.

CAREW-TERRY.

Great English Actress and Her Marriage to Her Leading Man.

It seems that the great actress Ellen Terry was wooed both before the footlights and behind the scenes by her leading man, James Carew. When Miss Terry sailed for England at the close of her recent tour of the United States the interesting fact was disclosed that she had for a third time taken a husband, the marriage, which occurred on March 22 before a Justice of the peace, having been kept secret until the actress was ready to sail for home. News of the romance was then conveyed to the public by the groom.

Mr. Carew is well known both in America and England and is a resident

of Chicago, though born about thirty-five years ago in the state of Indiana. He played prominent roles with Amelia Bingham in "The Climbers," with Henrietta Crossman in "Sweet Kitty Bellairs" and with Alice Fischer in "Mrs. Jack." About two years ago he joined the company of Miss Maxine Elliott and went abroad with her, appearing in "Her Own Way." A year later he joined Miss Terry's company, returning to America with her for the season just closed.

Miss Terry was born at Coventry, England, in 1848, and is therefore fifty-nine years of age, or nearly twenty-five years her husband's senior. She was married first to George Frederick Watts, the painter, from whom she separated. She was married a second time to Charles Wardell, an actor, known on the stage as Charles Kelly, who died some years ago.

STATE CLOSES CASE LAST WITNESS TESTIFIES

know who fired the first shot in 1901 except from hearsay.

Sackett admitted he helped to "escort" out of Tolleride the members of the union who were recognized as agitators and prevented peaceful citizens from going to work. Some men were deported who should not have been, and were allowed to return. He said they had tried to obtain the interference of the courts for years, but was unable to do so, and the deportations followed.

Rebuttal Finished.

Thomas M. Stuart, the last witness in rebuttal for the state, was called this afternoon.

Stuart was one of the men beaten and maltreated by the union miners during the troubles in Cripple Creek in 1903. He said he went to work in the Golden Cycle mine. After his work was done he went home and was visited by a dozen men, including Steve Adams, Sherman Parker, Michael and Campbell, who ordered him out. He refused to go. He was dragged out and beaten with guns and finally Campbell shot him through the back as he lay on the ground. He was in the hospital for three months.

On cross-examination he said that he had not sworn out warrants for his assailants until sixteen months ago, having delayed proceeding because the authorities could not find evidence to "back him up."

At 2:15 Senator Borah announced that the state rested in rebuttal.

Attorney Richardson announced that the defense might have some witnesses in sur-rebuttal.
