EXPERT REPORTS PUBLISHED BY FEDERATION

Clark is general manager of the foreign department of the General Electric Company. Professor Parsons has been a student of municipal ownership for years, and is the author of several works on the subject, among them "The Railways, the Trusts and the People."

In his review Mr. Clark compares the tramways of Great Britain with the private enterprises of the United States, much to the advantage of the latter. He declares that the American traction systems under private ownership are far more progressive than those of England, Ireland or Scotland; that they give far better suburban service, that cars are less crowded and that lines are being extended with far greater rapidity. This he attributes to the absence of restrictions in the United States as compared with Great Britain, where, he says, private traction companies are given franchises only on almost prohibitive terms. The difference of rate of fare in the two countries, Mr. Clark says, is more than offset by the great number of free transfers given by the American systems. He says that while on the face of reports it would appear that municipal operation of lines in some of the cities of Great Britain had been a success, that as a matter of fact just the opposite is true. He says that private companies in the United Kingdom give a superior service as compared with the municipally operated lines.

Professor Parsons, on the other hand, expresses the opinion that municipal ownership of British tramway systems has been successful from every point of view. He sets forth that the municipalities were the first to show a progressive spirit in changing from horse to electric cars; that their lines have been well managed and the service improved, and that fares have been lowered in spite of the fact that the hours of labor of employees were shortened, while in many instances wages were increased.

The comparison he makes are between British publicly-owned and privately owned companies, and in this connection he declares that the British plants must be measured by British, and not by American standards. The conditions and habits of the people are different, he says, and these differences must be taken into account in the judgment of the management of the tramways.

Professor Parsons also notes that in England the payment of a fare means that the passenger has a seat and not merely the right to transit.

HAY CROP REPORTED GENERALLY SHORT

Reports from the county indicate that as a rule the hay crop is poor, but the price is very fair, some offers being about ten dollars a ton. The cause of the small crop seems to be on account of the dryness of the early season, which has affected other crops to some degree.

Grain seems to be a little better than the grass crops. Though none has been threshed, the heads in most cases are well filled and promise much. Cutting of the fall sown grain has begun generally, in a few instances the binders being taken off because of the grain as yet being too green. Spring sown wheat is very green and will not be ready for the reaper for some time.
