RICH STRIKE MADE IN HIAWATHA QUARTZ LEDGE

MINERS BREAK INTO SPLENDID ORE IN BOHEMIA PROPERTY ABOUT TWO WEEKS AGO

Interest in Sunrise Mine Sold by Lovelace, of Dakota, for \$10,000—New Owners Arrive, Bringing a Mining Engineer—Future Plans of Company Formulated.

The miners drifting in on the Hiawatha quartz ledge in Bohemia broke into very rich ore about two weeks ago, the strike being kept from the public until this week. The owners of this mine are conservative, and never become excited when a body of good ore has been uncovered, but steadily continue drilling and blasting. Ore from the new strike has not been assayed, but expert miners put a good estimate on the value. The Hiawatha has always been a favorite mine, and could have been made a producer long ago if the owners had cared to install a reduction plant, but they chose rather to continue development work. The ore is base and must be concentrated and smelted.

The future plans of the company are not disclosed, yet it is understood that work will be carried forward. People well acquainted with the lead say that already there is \$150,000 worth of ore blocked out. The owners refuse, however, to confirm or deny the statement. They have a good mine, though, and are putting money into it.

Interest in Sunrise Sold. Mr. Lovelace, who formerly lived here, but is now a resident of Dakota, has sold his interest in the Sunrise mine, Bohemia district, to Egeen and Sweet, of Fargo, North Dakota, for \$10,000. The new owners are expected to bring the train at this station Sunday night, bringing with them a mining engineer. A meeting of the stockholders was held Monday and the directors chosen in place of those who have sold the stock. James Ostrander was re-elected. The new owners will be made known through the usual channels of the local press.

The ore body is large and the ore carries some free gold, but mainly base values. On the return of the party plans will be formulated for the future management of the mine. John Sweet, who worked in the camp for several months about four years ago, is one of the visitors, and will probably remain here for the present, at least.—Western Oregon.

TWO BOYS DROWNED IN WILLAMETTE

Frank and Henry Bayne, 11 and 8 years of age respectively, sons of Frank L. Bayne, of Peoria, were drowned at 3 o'clock yesterday afternoon. They were playing on some logs in the Willamette when they both fell in and drowned before help could be secured. The whole neighborhood turned out and began a diligent search for the bodies, and one was found at 11 o'clock. The search for the other was continued today. The body of the second boy was found just before noon after a long and diligent search. The report is the younger boy fell in and the older boy tried to get him out, when both went down struggling together. A young Githens boy was present and saw the drowning, but was too small to render assistance.—Albany Democrat.

JAPANESE MISTREAT PEOPLE OF KOREA

(Continued from Page One.)

man with a stick and faith. The Korean could do nothing. Protests avail nothing. The Japanese have seized the salt works, have driven away Korean fishermen and taken every form of profitable industry in the country for themselves. Huriburt accuses the Japanese government of abetting these things because she wants Korea for herself and that the accession of the crown prince to the throne would mean to change for the better in the intolerable conditions.

POPULACE CRASHED AND CRASH MAY COME

Seoul, July 19.—Enraged crowds assembled in various parts of the city this evening and inflammatory documents against the Japanese were freely distributed, giving rise to the suspicion that some active opposition is about to begin. Serious collisions between the Japanese police and Koreans are expected tonight, but it is not thought that Marquis Ito will resort to extreme measures of repression until all mild means of pacification are exhausted. The throne, which has been troubled with 44 years of misrule, troubled tonight. Great excitement followed the announcement, and the police guards were doubled, but no blood was spilt. The ablest Japanese believe the sending of Viscount Hayashi here was to divert the attention of the people from the question of America, where it is claimed the government is unable to get satisfaction, and to placate the nation by its severity to the Koreans. The question of The Hague denunciation was not believed to be of sufficient importance to have caused all the trouble. A crowd of five thousand Koreans was tonight beaten back from the palace gates. Japanese reports say the indications of a revolt are not substantiated.

RELATIONS WILL BE SMOOTH BECAUSE KOREAN IS WEAK

Seoul, July 19.—The ceremony of abdication, it is expected, will assume the form of a rescript transferring the throne to the late emperor's successor, before the date of the coronation of the new emperor has not been fixed. The populace of Seoul is greatly excited. While much sympathy is expressed here for the Korean emperor that has retired, the public is breathing easier for the sake of both countries, now that the arch-intriquer has been completely disarmed. It is confidently expected that hereafter the relations between Japan and Korea will be smooth.
