CONVICTS, THEIR FAMILIES
AND THEIR EMPLOYMENT
It is urged that convicts must not
be kept idle, that they must earn their
living, that the people should not be
taxed to feed and clothe an army of
criminals, and so forth, and so forth.
Let us see how this works.
The state arrests a young fellow who, let
us say, in a drunken quarrel has stab-
bed a companion. He is hurried away
to prison. He is brought into court,
tried and convicted. He is sent to
prison for five years or ten years,
or for life. All the while a young
wife and a half a dozen little children
are left without their natural protec-
tor and support. They huddle in a
corner of the court room. They hear
the lawyers yawn. They listen to the
verdict. The case is closed. The young
father is bundled off in one direction
in chains. The young family is
turned off in another in tears. The
state takes the time, the earnings
of the one to itself, leaving the
other to starve. The mother dies of
despair. The boys grow up thieves.
The girls grow up harlots. The law
is vindicated. The taxpayer is pro-
tected. The criminal classes are re-
plenished. Is it not damnable? Does
not the society which tolerates such
monstrosities deserve all the evils it
entails upon itself? The state has no
right to take that man's labor
from his wife and children and give
them an equivalent. It should punish
the guilty, not the innocent. Every
dollar that is diverted in this way
from the natural needs of the help-
less to the uses of the public is base
blood money that should and does
carry with it the curse of God.

How many are there who think
about these things when the employ-
ment of convict is under discussion?
If the people of Oregon fail to take
advantage of the colonist rates be-
ginning September 1st and continu-
ing until October 31st, it will not be
the fault of the newspapers, for both
the Eugene Daily Guard and local columns
of the paper of the state has kept the
fact before its readers. Remember
this is the one way rate, the tickets
are only to Oregon and not round-
trip, and good for any point in the
state, but the ticket must read to
some railroad station when it is
presented to the agent back in the
other states.

A resume of the lumbering indus-
try in the Eugene district, prepared
by Mr. Cornwall, editor of the Oregon
Timberman, for that journal, is re-
printed in today's Guard. It gives
the public an idea of the magnitude
of the milling business in Lane coun-
ty that will surprise many readers
who had given the matter no con-
siderable thought. And what it is
now but serves as an indication of its
importance in the not distant future.

PROUD OF EUGENE.
(Oregon Daily Journal.)
The Eugene Guard quite natu-
rally resents some unjust criticisms
that have been made regarding that
city's water, streets and walks, and
pardonably presents a more pleas-
ing picture of the university town.
It admits that the water is not yet
quite all that is desired, but says
that "next September the question
of issuing \$300,000 bonds will be
voted upon and carried by a large
majority, and after that the city
will be in a position to do business.
Either they will buy the present
plant and improve it so as to meet
all requirements, or they will con-
struct an entirely new system that
will solve the water problem in Eu-
gene for many years to come, if
not for all time. That is the pro-
gram as it has been arranged—and
it is going to be carried out."

No town of its size, asserts the
Guard, has better or cleaner streets
and walks, nicer lawns or greater
civic pride. That Eugene has begun
to be progressive, if it has not been
so before to as great an extent as
was desirable, is shown by the sub-
scription of \$60,000 to the stock
of the proposed Siuslaw railroad.
The whole state naturally takes
an interest and a pride in Eugene,
rather more than in any other city,
unless it be Salem, the capital, be-
cause it is the home of the state
university, and everybody of the pro-
gressiveness and attractiveness of
the pretty and growing city at the
head of the Willamette valley.

EUGENE LEADS SALEM
(Oregonian.)
Good-natured rivalry among the
cities of Oregon, in public improve-
ments, is likely to prove a very live
factor in stirring some of the towns
to action. A community does not
care much for the prodding it gets
from its own citizens, but when the
jabs come from a neighbor they hurt.
Eugene and Salem, for example, have
been boasting of street paving enter-
prises for some time, Salem having
started the movement. An incred-
ulous neighbor suggested that they
are paying the streets with their
mouths. Now Eugene has started ac-
tually work and takes occasion to re-
mind Salem of the fact in language
rather derisive. The Capital City
won't enjoy being prodded by a small
town enjoying much less state
patronage.

IS SETTING AN EXAMPLE.
(Pendleton Daily Tribune.)
The Eugene Guard complains that
the Oregonian and other state papers
have been treating its city unfairly
and gives forth a big growl as a con-
sequence. The Tribune had not ob-
served anything derogatory to Eu-
gene in any of the papers, and cer-
tainly for itself disclaims any such
sentiment at any time. This paper
regards Eugene as one of the most
progressive and deserving cities in
Oregon, as it is endeavoring in many
ways to better its own as well as the
condition of the country tributary
to it. It is setting an example that
should be followed by the rest of the
state. It is a good town in a good
country, it is filled with good people,
and the Tribune is pleased at all
times to say so.

HOUSE BURNED NEAR MAPLETON

Ses Martin Loses Dwelling and Near-
by All Its Contents—News of Flo-
rence and Vicinity.
The house belonging to Ses Mar-
tin, two and a half miles above Ma-
pleton, caught fire and burned to the
ground last Thursday, July 11. Mr.
and Mrs. Martin were some distance
away when they noticed the fire, and
when they reached the spot the roof
was all in flames. A sewing machine
and a few chairs are about all that
was saved from the building. A quan-
tity of cartridges were in the house
and the heat caused them to explode,
thus making it dangerous to go near
the scene.

Turned home a day or two before
burned home a day or two before
from an absence down the river.
They had been doing their cooking at
a campfire some 40 or 50 yards from
the house, but Thursday morning be-
ing rather cool, had built a fire in
the stove. This had not been re-
plenished since early in the morning,
and the fire was not noticed until about
4 o'clock in the afternoon. Mr. Mar-
tin thinks a spark must have caught
in some rubbish in the morning and
been smoldering there through the
day until it burst forth into a blaze
which destroyed the building.

Almost a Fire.
A blaze started on the roof of the
Bay View Hotel last Monday just be-
fore noon. Fortunately it was not
noticed before getting much headway,
and the alarm was given at once.
The fire company and citizens were
soon on the ground with extinguish-
ers and a line of hose was laid from
the pump house to the third story of
the hotel. By the time this was done
the fire had been about put out by
the extinguishers.

A few minutes later it was noticed
burning in another place, so the
pump was manned and water thrown
on the fire and the roof of the build-
ing wet down.

council Monday evening Marion Mor-
ris resigned his office as president of
the board of trustees and H. B. Gray
resigned as marshal.

Both resignations were accepted
and the council elected S. J. Shrum
as president and William Brund as
marshal. The election of Mr. Shrum

Dr. Geo. P. Edwards as trustee.
