ELECTRIC PLANT AT COTTAGE GROVE BURNS DOWN

WILLAMETTE VALLEY COMPANY SUFFERS HEAVY LOSS IN FIRE SUNDAY AFTERNOON AT ONE O'CLOCK.

Plant Entirely Consumed by the Flames—Fire Occurred When Water Was All Out of Reservoir—Brown Lumber Company's Sawmill Had Narrow Escape From Destruction.

The Willamette Valley Company's electric plant at Cottage Grove was completely destroyed by fire yesterday afternoon and that city will be in darkness for several days to come or until the plant is rebuilt.

The fire started about 1 o'clock, presumably from a spark from the smokestack of the engine dropping on the roof of the building. The fire alarm was sounded but the volunteer firemen of the town were powerless to check the blaze, as the water turned off for the purpose of cleaning out the reservoir. All the firemen and citizens could do was to prevent the spread of the flames to the nearby buildings. The Brown Lumber Company's sawmill is situated near the electric plant and it had a narrow escape from burning. As it was the company suffered a loss of about \$400 by the burning of some slab wood and damage to some of the buildings. The electric company also lost 150 cords of wood.

The entire plant was consumed by the flames and an entirely new one will have to be purchased. The engine, boilers and dynamos are now nothing but a twisted and melted mass of ruins and present a sorry spectacle.

The insurance on the building and plant was \$3,000, which only partially covers the loss.

Manager Russell Welch of the local office of the company, went up last night on the local to investigate the cause of the fire and to ascertain the loss.

The loss is thought to be about \$20,000.

REFRIGERATOR

WITHOUT ICE

Mrs. M. D. Cox, who lives west of town, has only one of New Invention West of Rocky Mountains.

Mrs. D. M. Cox, who lives three miles west of Eugene, near the Mulkey cemetery, has received the first article of a new invention—an iceless refrigerator—to be sent west of the Rocky Mountains. The invention is manufactured by a company at Council Bluffs, and it has been on the market for three years, the demand in the East having been so great that the one Mrs. Cox has is the first to come to the Pacific Coast.

The refrigerator is based upon the well-known principle of evaporation, by which evaporation consumes a certain amount of heat.

The refrigerator is a skeleton of galvanized iron, well built together, with walls constructed of Turkish towelling. A simple scheme keeps the towelling wet, from which there is a constant degree of evaporation, resulting in a cooling of the inner air tight chamber to a temperature of about 50 degrees.

While the refrigerator is the first of the manufactured article to appear on the coast, home made plans of a similar nature have long been known. Mrs. Cox may next year get a stock and sell them in the county.

Two Tons of Walnuts.

Elbert L. Cox, the son of Mrs. Cox, has about a two-ton crop of English walnuts on his little fruit farm. Walnuts flourish in this country, but have not been taken up as in California. Mr. Cox probably has the largest nut orchard in Lane county.
