LOGGERS ARE NOT TREATED WITH FAIRNESS

CORRESPONDENT WHO THINKS
NEWSPAPERS CAST UNDUE RE-

CLASS—THEY ARE AS HONEST,
SOBER AND INTELLIGENT AS
ANY OTHER WORKINGMEN—
DO NOT SPEND MORE MONEY
FOR WHISKEY THAN DO OTHER
TOILETS

Eugene, Or., July 6, 1907.

Editor Guard:—The man who works in the timber or whose perilous occupation it is to bring the logs through the dangerous waters of our streams to the mills, and his money, seems to be giving the papers and some of Eugene's citizens more than usual concern for some time past. In an article in your paper of July 2, you say:

"A large number of loggers from the Mohawk country arrived in Eugene last night and a great many more will be down tonight on their way to Portland to celebrate the Fourth of July. Each man has from \$50 to \$200 in cash and they all declare they will spend every cent of it before returning. One bank alone in this city cashed over \$15,000 worth of checks for the loggers yesterday. On account of the prohibition in Lane county every bit of this money will be spent in Portland, whereas in former years it was kept in Eugene and surrounding towns. The loggers are all free spenders and create prosperity wherever they do their trading. It is estimated that \$20,000 will be taken out of the county by the loggers with which to celebrate in Portland."

This article appears to me to cast a slur upon the men of this section who work in the timber for a living. It isn't the first time it has been done, for invariably when in the days of more frequent drunkenness in Eugene some poor fellow, be he miner, farmer, railroad man or what not, was arrested for intoxication your papers would refer to him as a "drunken logger," as though there were not as many drunken printers, painters, bricklayers, or of any other class of laborers as timber men.

In your article above quoted you class the entire lot of laborers in the timber as a gang of drunken spendthrifts, who have no higher ambition in life than to squander their hard earned wages for months in a drunk on spree or orgy on the Fourth of July. Notice particularly, you say they all declare they will spend every cent of the \$15,000 paid to them while celebrating in Portland on account of prohibition in Lane county. You probably forget that many of our number have homes and families in Portland; that they were brought here early in the spring to work in the timber, and that this is their first visit home since they left, and they go to take their earnings to their wives and little ones. If this is the kind of celebration you refer to, what has prohibition in Lane to do with it? If we are all a set of drunken spendthrifts, who only worked that we might satisfy the appetite for whiskey, why could we not have shipped it in from Portland and saved the expense of going there?

Mr. Editor, you do us a rank injustice—you have cast a stigma upon us as a class of honest laborers that is hard to bear. Only a very small part of the \$15,000 paid out in checks at one of your banks will be spent for liquor in Portland. By far the larger part of it will be put in circulation in Lane county, and the largest part of that which goes to Portland will be used to make homes happy and give comforts to friends and relatives. I know whereof I speak, and while we work hard, at great privation and fearful risk of life and limb, we have ambitions and aims in life as pure and high as any that prompt you, Mr. Editor, to right action or pure living.

It seems to me that it is high time to put a stop to these aspersions on the class of laborers to which I belong, and because one of our class gives way to his weakness, or folly, it is unjust to brand the whole class as a lot of drunken spendthrifts. The man or class of men whose souls are so narrow as to look with envious, envious eyes on the few paltry dollars that some poor, weak, foolish "logger" spends for drink to send him to perdition is not worthy to live in a community known as an educational center, whose aim it should be to lift up and make strong men instead of kicking them down hill to a fate which whiskey will bring every man who persists in using it.
