Portland Market Report.
Portland, Or., July 25—Apples this year will amount to only about two-thirds of a crop in the Northwest, according to the estimates of the various districts, and high prices are looked for as a result. To cold rains in blossoming time is attributed the shortage, but the quality is expected to be above the average on account of this thinning out of the fruit on the trees. Green apples have begun to appear in considerable quantities, and prices have declined, but this fruit is only fit for cooking this early in the season.

Peaches are expected to make a good crop in Oregon and Washington, but the demand on the part of the summer, as well as of housewives, will be more than equal to the supply, and so prices are likely to be stiff. Production of this class of fruit does not keep pace with the population, and so consumers who think peaches are too high for canning will have to resort to tomatoes, of which the crop is said to be good this season.

Egg Market Is Weak.
Eggs were considered weak at market quotations today. Both Oregon and Washington have been importing eggs from the East, which has driven the price for fresh ranch, Seattle dealers. It is said, are seeking to unload Eastern eggs on the Portland market, and thus further depress local prices. At the same time there seems to be a lack of demand for eggs in those localities usually furnished by Portland.

Oats Are Down \$1 a Ton
The Portland Flouring Mills marked down quotations on oats today on account of the beautiful yield which is to be harvested in the oat-producing regions of the Northwest. Barley is also considered on the decline in consequence of the heavy yield expected.

Old Potatoes All Gone
No demand exists for last year's potatoes, as the season is too late for them and the new crop is well enough along to supply local needs. What few old potatoes are left are too far gone to be considered a factor in the market. New potatoes are quoted at \$1.25 to \$1.75, with an inclination downward as the season progresses.

Alaska merchants are demanding fully matured potatoes to be shipped August 15. They must be in perfect condition, no green potatoes wanted. Portland commission men who have received orders are doubtful if they can be filled, and as a result Alaska markets will have to look to California.

Good potatoes can be sold almost at any price on Front street. It is possible that the Portland merchants could contract with the farmers in the valley for enough potatoes for the August shipment to Alaska, but in this event the price that would have to be paid would not leave enough of a margin for the commission men to work on. Therefore, those Alaska trade will go to other ports. If the potatoes wanted at Nome were for later shipment it might be possible that Oregon could supply it, but on account of the early date it is considered as almost impossible.

Commerce, who was already acquainted with Mr. Nutt, met the party, and with Mr. Hill and Mr. Nutt went over the details of the Astoria terminal proposition.
Mr. Hill and Mr. Nutt are both deeply interested in Astoria, and the terminal here and the public may expect that something of importance will come of this proposition in the near future. In Mr. Hill's private car were the maps of the entire river front from Tongue Point to Fort Stevens. Mr. Hill said it was necessary to have large terminals here and that if the ground in front of old Astoria is too hilly and too much filling is necessary, the terminals will have to be built a little further down the river, between Warrenton and Fort Stevens, where the ground is quite level.
