WILL ASCERTAIN

REAL VALUE

AND MAKE ASSESSMENT FOR
THIS YEAR ON ALL PROPERTY
WITH SOME DEGREE OF UNIFORMITY.

Assessment on Timber Lands Will Be
About Double What It Was Assessed At Last Year—Average Will Be \$10 to \$12 Per Acre—Some of the Heavy Timber Holders.

The course which Assessor Keeneey of Lane county is taking in making up the assessment roll at this time is meeting with the approval of most of the people and the thorough disapproval of a few, says the Eugene correspondent of the Oregonian. Mr. Keeneey has made it his particular business to ascertain the real value of property and assess with some degree of uniformity. Three noticeable changes will be made that will add to the income of the county when the next levy is made. First, the notes covering mortgages will be enumerated, timber lands will be assessed higher, and the Southern Pacific will pay more on its roadbed, rolling stock and its lands. Thousands of dollars in thoroughly secured notes have escaped taxation in the past partly because of the difficulty of finding them, and partly, no doubt, because of the habit of letting them go. Southern Pacific Land.
The Southern Pacific congressional lands, consisting largely of timber, but quite difficult to classify, will be assessed at an average of \$3 per acre, or just double last year's. The lands held by the railroad company will aggregate nearly 200,000 acres, and the increased valuation will alone add more than \$1,000,000 to the assessable property of Lane county. The valuation of the rolling stock and roadbed will be raised \$1000 a mile and there are 74.64 miles of track in the county.

The statement of the Southern Pacific of its rolling stock, while not very helpful in adding the assessor to make up his rolls, is very interesting so a few items of the department will show. The following is an exact copy of the statement made by the company for the information of the assessor in making his total assessment of Lane county:

Locomotives, all classes, 72; average value, \$2000; total value, \$144,000.
Passenger and chair cars, 41; average value, \$1350; total, \$55,350.
Cattle care, 41; average value, \$125; total, \$5140.
Caboose, 37; average value, \$200; total, \$7400.

The total valuation aggregates about \$500 per mile and the assessment will be \$1000.

FATE OF HAYWOOD IN HANDS OF TRIAL JURY

(Continued from Page 1.)

The conspiracy.
Judge Wood's charge contained more than 12,000 words, covering the case from every viewpoint. It is regarded by both sides as eminently fair. If anything, it was the consensus of opinion, the court leaned to the defense in his instructions.

Judge Wood concluded his charge at 10:59, and the courtroom was cleared one minute later, the jury in the meanwhile remaining in their box until 11:04, when they retired.

Judge Wood at 11:08 ordered a recess until 2 p. m.
Haywood listened with characteristic stoicism to the charge and when the jury retired went back to his cell with a confident smile playing about his lips. As he was about to leave the courtroom his gray-haired mother rushed up and kissed him. There was no other demonstration.

No Word From Jury.
There was no return from the jury at 2 p. m., when court reconvened.

Senator Borah closed his address for the prosecution last night. His peroration was as follows:
"If," he said, "the state has pointed out to you the man who was concerned in and executed this awful crime, then, in the name of manhood and womanhood of Idaho, do your duty without fear of any man or favor to any man."
"As I listened to the eloquent voice of counsel pleading for their client, there came to me the memory of another scene, of another time. I remembered again that night in a dark December in 1905—a night that added ten years to the lives of some here now in this room. I faced again the icy chill and faced the drifting snow. And I stood beside the body of my dead friend, whose lifeblood stained the snow."

"I felt again the disgrace that had come to Idaho. I saw the murdered man that meant more than murder, for it meant the first blow anarchy had aimed at my state. And on that night I said to myself: 'Can time unteach the lesson of this hour?'"
"Let us, then, be brave in this supreme moment. If the defendant is innocent, then let him go free; but if not, then let him take the punishment that the law prescribes."

"You have a higher duty to perform than ever before was asked of a jury in Idaho. Some of you men have stood the test in the past in the protection of your homes and flags, but you have never faced the duty that required higher courage than now."

"In every section of Idaho the thoughts of our people are with you, mingling with doubts of things that made these homes possible, and, in homes throughout this broad land men and women tonight look to you as brave men who have stood for right and the flag."

O. A. C. HUSTLING FOOTBALL PLAYERS

Corvallis, Or., July 26.—Ben Greenhaw, student manager of athletics of O. A. C., is arranging a football schedule for the coming season. The first game will be played at Eugene November 9, with the University of Oregon. Another will be played in Los Angeles on Thanksgiving day with the champions of California.

Dates have not been set as yet for other games, though Manager Greenhaw has had correspondence with the various Northwest teams. He thinks most of the games this year will be played away from home, as the other teams seem loath to come to Corvallis to meet the college boys.

Coach Norcross will again handle the men, and it is expected to arrive in Corvallis about September 17. He will be accompanied by two able football men whom he has played with on the University of Michigan team, who will assist him in coaching and training the O. A. C.

With one exception the entire team of last year is expected back. They will probably arrive before college opens and begin light practice. Besides these, four of the team of two years ago will enter O. A. C. and some of them will secure places on this year's team.

Manager Greenhaw says he has also received letters from several football men of note from other states, who contemplate attending college here. Competition for places on the first team bids fair to be spirited on account of travel to play on foreign fields.
