EXCURSIONISTS MEET DEATH IN TRAIN WRECK

Butler, Pa., July 27.—Three men were killed and a score injured in a wreck on the Allegheny & West-ern near here today.

The wreck was caused by the breaking of a rail beneath the engine drawing a heavy train of picnicers employed on the Buffalo, Rochester & Pittsburgh railroad, on their way from Dubois to Newcastle.

STEAMER BURNED. NO LOSS OF LIFE

Auburn, N. Y., July 27.—The steamer Frontenac burned on Cayuga Lake, opposite Farley's Point, this afternoon. Nine of the fifty passengers were drowned and several injured.

Later a telephone message from Es-Mayer Burgess, of Auburn, says no lives were lost.

days of actual trial and a day and a half of arguments by Assistant District Attorney Henry for the people and T. C. Coogan and Delphin M. Delmas for the defense.

The reading of Judge Lawlor's charge to the jury consumed one hour and at its conclusion the courtroom was cleared. The jury was given in charge by two deputy sheriffs and by them conveyed in a tally-ho to the Fairmount hotel.

The entire morning session, from 10 o'clock until a few minutes past 12, was occupied by Mr. Delmas in the closing argument for the defense.

Mr. Henry, in the judgment of able observers, exceeded his powerful effort in closing for the prosecution in the Mayor Schmitt extortion case. Judge Lawlor instructed the jury that it was not necessary that there be direct evidence of expressed agreement of conspiracy. It is competent to prove that the defendant was a party to the conspiracy by circumstantial as well as direct evidence. He said the prosecution must prove the bribing of Boston and the connection of the defendant with giving the bribe; and if the prosecution fails to prove that connection, the verdict must be "not guilty."

NO MORE CEMETERIES WANTED IN CITY LIMITS

There is a movement on foot by a number of leading citizens to submit to the voters of the city the question of whether or not new cemeteries shall be laid out within the city limits and whether or not the one already within the limits shall be enlarged. A notice to cemetery owners to that effect is published in today's Guard. An effort has been made by several members of the city council to prevent the enlarging of the I. O. O. F. cemetery, as contemplated at present, but an ordinance looking to that end was defeated at the last meeting of the council.

MRS. SHANNON'S ESTATE WORTH \$15,703.03

T. G. Hendricks, executor of the estate of Mrs. Elizabeth Shannon, this afternoon filed in the probate court the inventory of the property of the estate. There are the following items in the report: Money, \$854.53; promissory note, \$256; other personal property, \$12.50; real estate, \$14,600. Total, \$15,703.03.

An order was made by Judge Chrisman directing the executor to sell the following pieces of real estate to pay the cash legacies made in the will: The east half of lot 1, block 14, Mottman's addition to Eugene, and 80x80 feet in Skinner's addition to Eugene.

NEWS NOTES

The Lumbermen's Association of Washington has raised \$100,000 to fight the proposed freight rate increase on Eastern shipments. They will appeal to Oregon lumbermen to assist them.

The Corvallis Times reports that Stephen Carver's railroad from that place to Alsea has been located for the first six miles.

The steamer Geo. W. Elder, which left Portland for San Francisco last night, carried a number of people to Eureka, who will remain there for some time, hoping to recover bodies of loved ones lost in the Columbia disaster. Among those bound for Eureka are R. D. Cannon, city editor of the Telegram, who will wait till the body of his mother, Mrs. R. B. Cannon, is washed ashore, and William Pyle, who will seek for the body of Mrs. William H. Souls.

BESET BY BIG BIRDS. Two Ostriches Get Loose on Ship and Terrorize Crew.

DEVOUR A KEG OF NAILS.

Refuse to Poke Their Heads Into Sand Provided For Them by Their Would Be Captors and Refuse to be "Shooed."

A couple of ostriches broke loose aboard the steamer Allemania, which recently reached Havana from Nice, and there were things done on the Allemania for awhile or longer.

The ostriches were consigned to the firm of Barbour & Pearson, who have established an ostrich farm in Maricao. Mr. Barbour had gone aboard

Ostriches, like falcons, are tractable when they can't see, and so when it is desired to load or unload them they are hooded. The interpreter asked Mr. Barbour if it wasn't hot for the ostriches with the hoods over their heads, and Mr. Barbour conceded that it was, at the same time stepping into the cabin to attend to some papers. The interpreter, misinterpreting Mr. Barbour's assent to his obviously correct remark upon the weather, officiously unhooded two of the desert chicks, and trouble began immediately to ensue and kept right on ensuing.

But all that is digression. The two birds rumped about, kicking right and left, while crew and passengers took refuge below or aloft, and they gobbled a few belaying pins and bolt heads and other hard things to digest that were thrown at them or that they found lying about. Then they stalked back and forth majestically, and the swifter bird tried to crow and flap his wings, but failed absurdly, as the crew of the ostrich and his wings are rudimentary.

The sudden activity aboard the Allemania, caused by the loosing of the birds, had been followed by enforced idleness of all hands, and the problem of how to unload the rest of the cargo became a serious one, the captain swearing loudly that he couldn't afford to pay demurrage on account of a couple of blanked dry land stormy petrels. Finally some one suggested that they might be caught by sprinkling salt on their tails, and the cook was ordered up from his galley with a sack of salt. He came up pale and trembling and was saved from the deadly kick of the ostrich only by the timely interposition of an ornithologist among the passengers, who called the angry captain's attention to the fact that ostriches haven't any tails.

One who had traveled in Africa then fanned hope again into a flicker by suggesting that if they only had some sand for the ostriches to stick their heads into they could catch them easily; that that was the way they always caught them in the desert, where there is plenty of sand.

A boat was at once lowered and dispatched to the city for sand. When it returned with its cargo the sand was hoisted aboard and dumped on the deck at the end farthest from the ostriches and made into nice heaps like gigantic golf tees, after which several of the crew were sent around in the boat to the bow of the ship, at which end the ostriches were, to say "Shoo!" The ostriches wouldn't "shoo," as they had found a keg of nails and so were taking dinner.

A brave lady went out among the sand dunes and called, "Birdy, birdy!" But the desert scorcher disregarded her blandishments. A small boy asked the captain why he didn't scuttle the ship and drown 'em alive, "like the pirates do." About that time the birds finished the keg of nails and came majestically stalking aft, but stopped halfway and began picking their teeth with their toe nails. The ornithologist suddenly remembered that ostriches in captivity are very fond of broken bottles, especially for dessert, and two of the crew were at once set to work breaking bottles. When the ostriches sighted the dainty repast they made for it with all haste, and while they were regaling themselves ropes were put about their legs and they were carried ashore bound hand and foot.
