FINEST DEPOT ON LINE WILL BE BUILT IN EUGENE THIS YEAR

FRIGHTFUL LOSS OF LIFE AND PROPERTY IN NEW YORK FIRES

New York, July 29.—Shocking loss of life and property damage estimated at \$1,000,000 occurred in New York during this morning. Twenty are dead and fifteen are suffering from injuries as a result of a fire in a six-story tenement house on Christie street. Property damage occurred by the burning of the Long Beach Hotel at Long Beach, Steeple Chase Park and other property at Coney Island and a fire in the hold of the steamship Hamilton. The Hamilton came into port yesterday with a part

of its cargo afire, but was docked before the passengers knew there was a fire on board. The loss is \$15,000.

The explosion of a bomb caused an Italian tenement fire. It was the deed, so the police believe, of the Black Hand. The explosion created a panic, and the police say many persons perished in the flames, because they feared to escape to the streets, where they thought death awaited them from the Black Hand. A second fire, caused by the ex-

LOUIS GLASS JURY UNABLE TO AGREE

San Francisco, July 29.—After 16 ballots, in which there was small variation from the original standing of the body—seven for conviction and five for acquittal, the jury in the Louis Glass bribery case was discharged yesterday afternoon by Judge Lawlor.

The men who stood out for acquittal were: Michael Samuels, a photographer; George Kahn, a commission broker; Jacob Wertheimer, a wholesale cigar dealer; Charles P. Fonda, a wholesale manufacturers' agent, and Hugo Shusler, a retired grocer. There was no disagreement as to the payment of a bribe, but it was contended by the men who voted for acquittal that the crime had not been

positively fastened upon Glass. The retrial of the case has been set for August 5.

THEODORE HALSEY'S CASE CONTINUED TILL WEDNESDAY

San Francisco, July 29.—Judge Dunne has continued the case of Theodore Halsey, indicted for bribery in connection with the telephone franchises, until next Wednesday in order to draw an entirely new panel.

In Judge Lawlor's court Louis Glass' bail was again fixed at \$10,000 and the case set for retrial on Monday, August 5.

(Associated Press Bulletin. Boise, Ida., July 28.—The jury in the Haywood murder trial at 8 o'clock a. m. returned a verdict of not guilty.

GOVERNOR GOODING WILL NOT GIVE UP

Boise, July 29.—The probability of a verdict of acquittal in the case of the secretary-treasurer and acknowledged leader of the Western Federation of Miners had been freely predicted Saturday when Judge Wood read his charge, which was regarded as strongly favoring the defense in its interpretation of the laws of conspiracy, circumstantial evidence and the corroboration of an accomplice who confessed.

It was also freely predicted that in the event of Haywood's acquittal the state would abandon its prosecution of his associates, Charles H. Moyer, the president of the Federation, and George A. Pettibone, of Denver. Statements from counsel and from Governor Gooding dispel this view of the situation. Governor Gooding said:

"The verdict is a great surprise to me, and I believe to all citizens of Idaho who have heard or read the evidence in the case. I have done my duty. I have no regret as to my action, and my conscience is clear. As long as God gives me strength I shall continue my efforts for government by law and for organized society."
