EUGENE BOOSTERS DO GOOD WORK FOR CITY

The result of the visit of a dele-
gation of some thirty businessmen of
Eugene to Portland, for the purpose
of conferring with the Southern Pa-
cific Company regarding matters of
special interest to this city, was high-
ly satisfactory. The needs and wishes
of our people were presented in a
good-natured and business-like man-
ner, and General Manager O'Brien
treated the committee courteously
expressing his gratification at being
able to meet personally the represen-
tatives of all lines of business in the
community, and to hear from them
exactly what they thought was neces-
sary in the way of railroad facilities
to develop the country and to prop-
erly handle the business at its pres-
ent stage.

The net results of this move on the
part of the Greater Eugene "boost-
ers" may be summed up as follows:

The positive assurance that a new
depot will be built this year, to
together with a large freight warehouse
and the complete re-construction of
the yards, with small parks or gras
plats about the passenger station to
add to their attractiveness, and a re-
arrangement of the warehouse dis-
trict in harmony with the general
plan of improvement. Mr. O'Brien
was emphatic in his statement that
the depot and yards would be a credit
to the university city of Eugene and
because of the large passenger
traffic in and out of the station special
consideration would be given this
city in the matter of buildings and
yards.

The Wendling branch train sched-
ule will be re-arranged as soon as
practicable, so as to give people from
the country longer time to remain in
Eugene and yet be able to return
home the same day. It is thought
that it will be possible to make a lay-
over of about four hours here before
the afternoon train goes back to
Wendling.

Assurance was given that, unless
some obstacle not now apparent is
presented, the Albany-Springfield
trains would run into Eugene in the
evening and leave this place in the
morning. This will give a large sec-
tion of the county a direct connec-
tion with the county seat never be-
fore enjoyed.

Other matters were discussed and
assurance was given that Eugene
would in the future receive every
consideration that its importance as a
shipping point entitled it to, and that
every reasonable effort would be
made by the railroad company to co-
operate with the movement now in
full swing to build a Greater Eugene.

The conference was very pleasant,
and Mr. O'Brien admitted that he
learned a great many things about
Eugene and Lane county that he had
not known before, while he convinced
the visitors in his brief talk that
there were many things in connec-
tion with the operation and manage-
ment of a railroad that they had not
understood or taken into considera-
tion.

Eugene will be the prettiest, most
up-to-date city of its size on the Pa-
cific coast by the end of next year. It
will have electric cars, the entire
business section will be paved and a
new and modern passenger station
will give the visitor a favorable im-
pression when he alights from the
train.

The Santiam mines have been sad-
ly neglected during the past few
years, since the Lawler days there,
when \$200,000 were said to have
been spent in development work, but
Mr. Currie is confident there is just
as good ore there as anywhere along
the coast and proposes to get some
of the product, which new methods
of mining ought to secure.—Albany

RANKIN MAKES BENTON COUNTY TIMBER DEAL

Another timber deal was consum-
mated in Corvallis yesterday where-
by M. B. Rankin, of Portland, became
the possessor of nearly 4,000 acres
of the best timber land in Benton
county. This is a deal of consider-
able importance as Mr. Rankin is
considered the timber king of western
Oregon, and as Benton county con-
tains some of the best timber in the
Coast range, his recent purchases
make him an important personage
in this neighborhood and our people
may hope for some early develop-
ments along this line. He now owns
nearly 30,000 acres in this county
alone and the new railroad will in-
crease its value and put it in easy
access to market, as much of this
virgin forest will be penetrated by
the new road.—Corvallis Times.

BY ADVERTISEMENTS

Complaint comes from Newport
that advertising agencies are destroy-
ing the scenery along the beach with
glaring placards and signs telling of
the merits of their respective produc-
tions. The "toe of the shoe" on
"Jump-off-Joe," it is said, has been
visited by the "add man" and now
visitors to the coast see large white
letters shrieking the wares of the
real estate agent and the confection-
ery store. Other points on the beach
frequented by tourists are now dis-
figured with unsightly advertise-
ments. Citizens of Newport who ap-
preciate the value of their summer
resort for its scenery are agitating
a movement to rid the beach of this
form of advertising.

RUNS BACK TO THE COMMON PEOPLE

The Mammutter magazine for July,
published at Los Angeles, contains
a most interesting article by Gov-
ernor Chamberlain on "The Initiative
and Referendum and the Direct Pri-
mary Law in Oregon." Among other
things the governor says:
"It may be stated, therefore, that
while the initiative and referendum
and the direct primary nominating
law are in the tentative stage in Ore-
gon, they promise much for the bet-
terment of social and political con-
ditions if we may judge what may
be done in future by what has al-
ready been accomplished."

Further, he says: "These popular
measures will grow in strength and
in favor. Their adoption in many
other states and their discussion in
all testify to the conditions of the
public mind and the determination
of the people to win back to them-
selves the power of self-government
given them under the constitution,
but gradually surrendered to the ma-
chine and to special interests. If all
that is hoped for is accomplished
under these first enactments which
look to the re-establishment of the
people's rule, Oregon will go a step
farther in the very near future and
essay the recall of unworthy public
servants. As yet this has not been
done, but already the enactment of
such a law under the initiative is
being seriously discussed on the ro-
strum and in the press."
