ROSEBURG

MEN LEAD IN O. N. G. CONTEST

Roseburg, July 29.—Honors on the state rifle range went chiefly to Roseburg riflemen today, local marksmen winning first and second place in the 600-yard firing, while Roseburg men are in first place tonight in the gold-medal competition.

Contrary to plans, the national competition was not finished today. The keen rivalry that exists among the various teams caused each rifleman to consume every second of the minute and a half allowed him for every shot. The contest dragged out through the entire day, with slow firing over the 600-yard range.

Despite adverse conditions the marksmanship was excellent, and the scores proved worthy of regular army sharpshooters. Lieutenant G. E. Houck, of Roseburg, finished first with a score of 46 out of a possible 50. Another Roseburg man, Corporal S. C. Jackson, took second place with 45. Corporal Perrie, of Cottage Grove finished third, 44, and Captain F. H. Hamlin, of Roseburg, 4th, with a score of 43.

The leaders tonight in the gold-medal competition are Captain Hamlin, 219 out of 350; Sergeant A. Q. Johnson, of Roseburg, 217; Sergeant A. J. Role, of Portland, 211, and Corporal C. S. Jackson, 211.

The contest is not over, however, by any means. Two ranges, 500 and 1,000 yards, must yet be fought out, and a few misplaced shots would serve to put any of the leaders out of the race, as dozens of competitors are close in their wake.

Camp will be broken tomorrow afternoon in accordance with orders issued today by Adjutant-General Finzer, who is supervising the competition in person. The rifle teams will return to their home stations on the afternoon train.

SAILORS DIE OF SMALLPOX ON WILMINGTON

Washington, July 29.—A dispatch from Commander Bousch, of the gunboat Wilmington, at Nankin, says a boiler tube burst yesterday scalding three men, one of whom, Philip Hind, subsequently died.

Unofficial reports of several deaths from smallpox on the Wilmington have reached the department.

TWO HOTTEST DAYS OF THE SUMMER

Today and yesterday were scorches, the hottest of the present summer, today being a trifle the hotter of the two. At 11 o'clock this morning the thermometer registered 86 in the shade, and at 1 o'clock this afternoon it had risen five degrees higher. At 3 this afternoon it was 92, and probably reached a still higher point after that, although usually about 4 o'clock the atmosphere begins to grow cooler. As far as is learned there have been no prostrations from the heat in this city or vicinity, except one at Hale, west of Eugene, Sunday. The farmers and harvesters in the fields and the men at work on the street car line and the street paving have suffered from the heat but there have been no serious results.

Late in the afternoon clouds gathered in the sky and thunder was heard. A small shower of rain fell.

S. W. Taylor, of this city, today received a telegram from his daughter, Mrs. Samuel T. Thurston, at Alhambra, Arizona, stating that her husband had died. The deceased, who was a member of the University of Oregon football team a number of years ago, was aged 29 years. He was married to Miss Blanche Taylor in Eugene in April, 1903, and one child, a son, was born to them. Besides his wife and child the deceased leaves his parents, who reside at Suver, Polk county, and a number of brothers and sisters, one brother, "Gyp" Thurston, being well known here. He was also a star football player on the O. A. C. team. It is not known at this time where the body will be buried, but it is probable that it will be brought north and the funeral will be held at the family home in Polk county.

ROSEBURG CARRIES OFF MEDALS IN RIFLE SHOOT

Roseburg, Or., July 30.—Roseburg militiamen carried off nine of the eleven medals. Lieutenant Houck received the gold medal for the highest aggregate score in all ranges and the silver medal for the best score at slow fire. Captain Hamlin won two silver medals for second score in all ranges and for the best score at skirmish. Private Shields, a silver medal for best score at rapid fire and bronze medal for fifth score on all ranges. Corporal J. Jackson, silver medal for third highest in all ranges. Sergeant Johnson and Stewart, bronze medals for fourth and seventh best scores on all ranges. All of these are of the Roseburg company.

The other two bronze medals for sixth and eighth highest scores were won by Private Romaine and Major Howard. These medal winners, together with eight other marksmen, will be detailed here to practice for the national shoot at Fort Clinton, Ohio, next month. Among the latter are Captain C. C. Hammond and Corporal R. L. Perdue, of Eugene.
