ACTUAL PAVING WORK BEGINS ON STREET

THREE CAR LOADS OF BITUMEN ARRIVES FROM CALIFORNIA LAST NIGHT AND IS UNLOADED

Work of Taking Surface Dirt and Gravel Off Willamette Street Begun This Morning—Construction Will Be Rushed Until Work Is Entirely Completed.

Three cars of bitumen for the street paving arrived here from California last night and the material was unloaded today at the Warren Construction Company's grounds on Lincoln street.

Now that the paving material has arrived active operations will be carried on by the company till the paving work is entirely completed. The work of tearing up Willamette street so that the earth can be removed to put the street on the proper grade when the pavement is laid was begun on the block opposite the Hotel Gross this morning. The big traction roller was attached to a road roller, and effective work was done. The surface of the street will be lowered to a point an inch and a half below the top of the street railway ties and then built up even with the top of the rails with bituminous material, which consists of crushed rock, bitumen and other stuff.

The work of building the cement curbs is progressing rapidly, and over three blocks on both sides of the street have been finished. A large force of men than at first has been put on and the work will be kept pretty well ahead of the paving work and just far enough behind the street railway work so that it will not be in the way of either.

GORDON STARTS FACTORY IN PORTLAND

Herbert Gordon, formerly in the furniture business in Eugene, has gone into the manufacturing business in Portland. He has opened a small plant on Union avenue and will manufacture shades cloth and shade goods in general. The name of the firm operating the plant is Herbert Gordon & Co. Jerry Horn, also formerly of Eugene, is working for him. Mr. Gordon's five-story brick building at Park and Yamhill streets in the metropolis is now progressing faster than it has for several weeks past. The second story has been completed and the whole structure will not be finished until about December 1st. The contract calls for its completion by the first of October.
