CITY COUNCIL MET IN SPECIAL SESSION LAST NIGHT

A special meeting of the city council was held last night. It was held principally for the purpose of listening to the argument prepared by the city attorney and fire and water committee on the change proposed in the city charter so that the city can issue waterworks bonds, the matter to be voted on the second day of September. The argument seemed to satisfy the members of the council present and it will be published within a few days.

Two petitions for paving Eighth street, from High to Charnelton, were presented and they were referred to the street committee to incorporate them into one so that an ordinance can be prepared ordering the work done.

A motion was made that the council instruct the city attorney to prepare an ordinance requiring the property owners on Willamette street where no cement sidewalks now exist to build them. The motion resulted in a tie. It was then moved to have the street committee interview the property owners in regard to the matter and this was carried.

The matter of superintending the street paving and street railway work on the part of the city engineer was discussed. It was stated that Engineer Wagoner was not putting in the time thought necessary, but no action was taken.

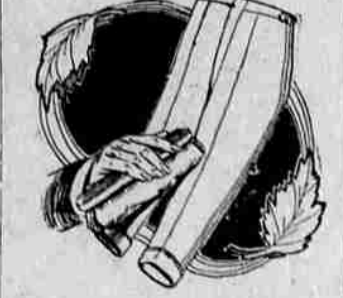

He will single-foot it to the nearby districts also to meet his old friends and make new ones. By next spring his admirers think he will be in fine fettle to trot in a winner in the spring meet with Fulton.

Mr. Mulkey has already once romped in a winner, but he is remembered in the senatorial sweepstakes, and followers of the political ponies are scanning the form charts to dope out his previous performances and get a line on his chances to push his nose under the wire ahead of the salmon county statesman.—Oregonian.

EXCURSION TO WENDLING A BIG SUCCESS

Over two hundred people went on the excursion to Wendling and back today, the occasion being the inauguration of the passenger train service between this city and Wendling. The train left here about 7:15 o'clock, it being late on account of the rush at the ticket window, and reached Wendling about on schedule time. An hour was spent by the excursionists looking through the big sawmill of the Booth-Kelly Company and viewing sights of the lumbering town. The train arrived in Eugene again about noon, bringing most of the excursionists home well pleased with the trip. Some of them remained at Wendling for the afternoon train, which is scheduled to reach Eugene at 5:40.

The excursionists going up filled three coaches and a "dummy" coach and many had to stand up. More people than were expected took advantage of the occasion to visit the sawmill towns.
