FANATIC ARABS KILL EUROPEANS IN HOLY WAR

Tangier, Aug. 1.—Dr. Merle, who arrived here last night on a German ship, which brought a number of Jews and other refugees from Casa Blanca, says that the slaughter of Europeans at Casa Blanca was the outcome of a holy war preached by the Arabs for the extermination of Europeans. During the trouble, at least eight were killed.

The Arabs then attacked the workmen on the harbor works, killing several and burning their bodies.

Dr. Merle believes that Casa Blanca will be the scene of further trouble, and expects the town to be invaded by twenty thousand Arabs today.

CONVICT ESCAPES FROM SALEM PEN

Salem, July 31.—By working a clever ruse upon a green guard in the prison brick yard Charles P. Duke, an ex-convict and newspaper reporter, who was doing two years and a half for obtaining money under false pretenses, walked away from the penitentiary unobserved and literally from under the shadow of the guard's rifle barrel, into the public highway and to liberty about 3 o'clock this afternoon. Duke had no sooner got under cover of the dense undergrowth of brush upon the opposite side of the road from the prison than his absence was discovered by Foreman L. Burton, of the brickyard, and reported to the prison authorities. Guards were dispatched in all directions in search of the fugitive, but up to a late hour tonight he had not been apprehended.

ACTRESS SORRY NOW SHE MARRIED

Denver, Col., July 31.—Maude Fealy Sherwin is sorry now that she did it. Married in haste, she has repented after a few hours' reflection, and states that she will refuse to see her newly acquired husband, Hugo L. Sherwin, for at least one year.

Whether the well-known actress has experienced a change of heart or whether the violent storm which shook the mother, Mrs. Cavallo, when she learned of her daughter's marriage, is responsible for Maude Fealy's statement today that she will annul the marriage contract, if possible, is not stated. It is probable, however, that the mother's grief and disapproval are the underlying causes for the young woman's assertions.

Miss Fealy and Hugo Sherwin, a dramatic critic on one of the Denver papers, were married by Judge Hudson at the courthouse. Major Arthur Williams and Jerome Tuttle, night watchman at the building, were the witnesses. They were all sworn to secrecy by Sherwin, but none of them knew that the bride was the celebrated actress.

Miss Fealy was married under her real name of Hawk. It happened this way. Her mother was Margaret Fealy before her marriage to Hawk, her first husband. While the Hawks were living in Tennessee, Maude was born. The marriage proved unhappy, a divorce followed and Mrs. Hawk assumed her maiden name of Fealy. The daughter likewise adopted the surname for use on the stage, consequently when the marriage license was made out to Hugo Sherwin and Miss Hawk not one of those who witnessed the ceremony knew her real identity.
