The remains of the Fourth of July fire on the empty lot opposite the Hotel Gross were carted away today.

L. G. Hullin has purchased from Mrs. Geo. M. Hawley, of Creswell, a house on Olive street and moved into it today.

Miss Livia Z. Bond will give a pupil's recital next Wednesday evening, August 7, at Ellers Piano House. Every one come.

L. W. Stewart, of this city, has been awarded the contract for the erection of B. H. McKinney's two-story business building at Springfield. The contract price is near \$3000.

O. W. Fidler and family have moved from Lorane to Eugene, and will reside here in the future. They have purchased the Whitaker residence on West Fourth street.

The concrete basement walls of Percy P. Adams' new residence on Mill street between East Twelfth and East Thirteenth are up and the carpenter work will begin at once.

One of the workmen on the street railway line dug up a gold dollar in the middle of the street yesterday. It was of the date of 1852, and had probably been buried in the street for many years.

L. N. Roney will start a force of men for the mouth of Lake creek, on the Sluslaw road, tomorrow, to work on the Lake creek bridge. They will put in new piers and make other repairs to the structure.

It was stated yesterday that some men put out the fire in Mrs. Brown's barn yesterday afternoon. This is a mistake. We are informed that the blaze was extinguished entirely by

women, Mrs. Bruce Garrison heading the brigade.

Mrs. W. S. Gladstone, of this city, today received a telegram from Millersburg, Pa., stating that her father, Wm. A. Smith, had died. He was aged 72 years and had been a railroad for the past 50 years. He leaves ten children.

A residence belonging to H. H. Flisk at Mapleton was destroyed by fire Monday, together with nearly all its contents. The house was occupied by Rev. Phelps, pastor of the church there. The loss is perhaps \$600 or \$700, with little insurance.

Mrs. Minnie Halwax, of Junction, has been granted a divorce by Judge Harris from Conrad Halwax on the ground of cruel and inhuman treatment. She also receives \$10 a month alimony for the support of their two minor children, whose custody Mrs. Halwax is granted.

OREGON TO BE COAST TERMINAL

Jacksonville, Or., July 31.—Authentic information has reached here to the effect that the Pacific & Eastern Railway Company is making preparations to build to the coast, 150 miles, to a terminus not yet selected. The surveys have been in the field for two or three weeks, and have found an outlet over the Jackson creek divide. From what can be learned it is the intention of the company to build up Jackson creek to Lower Applegate, when a turn toward the Blue Ledge district will be made in order to get as near as possible to that rich mineral section.

In all probability the road will strike the coast at a point below Crescent City. William Donnell, trackman for the Pacific & Eastern, was at Jacksonville yesterday, and with his crew of men is making arrangements to start the preliminary construction work.

The line to this point from Medford will parallel the Rogue River valley line, the management of which will then electrify their road. President Barnard, of the Rogue River Valley Line, is now in New York making arrangements to that end.

Officers of the Oregon Banking & Trust Company are behind the new project, it is said.

HEAVY RAILS SHIPPED AWAY FROM DRAIN

Heavy rails piled up at Drain for the Southern Pacific's extension to Coos Bay have been taken away, giving rise to the report that the company had abandoned the Coos Bay extension. These rails were taken to the California & Northeastern, to be used in rush work on the line that is to be made the main line of the Southern Pacific around the Siskiyou mountains. Other rails will be substituted for use on the Coos Bay extension. The Klamath Falls line is being laid with 86-pound rails, the heaviest rail that is now being used in ordinary railroad construction. The builders received orders from E. H. Harriman, it is said, to push construction on the Klamath Falls line, and as there were no heavy rails at Drain were appropriated. It is reported that the Coos Bay line will be laid with 65-pound rails.

The builders expect to complete the Klamath Falls line to Dorris this fall, and to Klamath Falls by next spring. After the road reaches Dorris it will encounter three or four miles of heavy work and two tunnels. These will be handled during the winter months.—Portland Journal.

LODGING HOUSE KEEPER ARRESTED ON SERIOUS CHARGE

Considerable excitement was created on the streets last evening about 8 o'clock by the report that there was an insane woman acting very strangely in the vicinity of the high school. Chief of Police Farrington and Night Officer Purdy proceeded to the scene and found a girl about 17 years of age yelling at people on the streets, throwing rocks and trying to break out the windows of the school building. She was taken to the county jail and later to the Hotel Gross, where she was placed under the care of a woman guard. It developed that the girl, whose name is Emma Toole, and whose home is at St. Johns, had been drinking and appeared to have been drugged. If the story she tells is true there is considerable trouble ahead for at least two men and one woman. Deputy Sheriff Hammond and Prosecuting Attorney Skipworth interviewed her here this morning and learned that she and another girl by the name of Pearl Gillin came here from St. Johns Wednesday night. They stopped at the Hotel Gross, intending to get work at the Eugene woolen mill. Yesterday, she says, they met a number of young men and began to drink with them. They went to the Lewis and Clark lodging house early in the evening and there, she says, she was assaulted by William Arnold, proprietor of the place. The other girl, a fellow by the name of Mays and a woman named Minnie Savage, all of whom she had been with during the day, left for the country, and Arnold left on the 7 o'clock train last night for Portland.

The Toole girl had every symptom of having been drugged. She was examined this morning by Dr. Wall, who found that she had evidently taken something to stimulate her brain, as she talked incessantly, but as the day advanced she grew better and is in a normal condition again.

Arnold Arrested
Arnold returned to town this afternoon and was placed under arrest, by Deputy Sheriff Hammond and Chief of Police Farrington. He was placed in the county jail and will have his preliminary examination tomorrow. The charge against him is rape. He made admissions to the officers after his arrest that will probably go a long way toward his conviction. Other arrests will probably follow.

PORTLAND MARKET REPORT

Portland, Or., Aug. 1.—Demand for watermelons has suddenly developed with the warm weather of the past few days. Until yesterday there had been but few inquiries for melons, and Front street was becoming overstocked. The sales of melons today, however, are quite encouraging, and the stocks will all sell easily. More are arriving on each freight, but are being reshipped fast.

Some of the merchants are recycling more tomatoes than they can justly handle. All kinds of prices are ruling as a result. The tomatoes are usually of a good grade, and are Oregon product, shipped from The Dalles.

Oregon and California peaches will be short. The crop will be somewhat larger than the apricot crop, but it is not expected that they will ever drop to a very low figure, as the demand for peaches is greater than the demand for apricots. The same condi-

tions will rule practically, however, in the apricot market.
Potatoes Plentiful
New crop Oregon Irish potatoes are plentiful and some of the early varieties have practically matured. With the trade generally these have taken the place of old stock, but with bakers and restaurant men there is still a limited demand for last year's tubers. This will entirely disappear within a week or two. New potatoes sell around \$1 a hundred, and such of the old stock as is sold brings about the same price.

Market is Short of Berries.
But few berries of any kind were to be seen on Front street this morning. Red raspberries and black caps are scarce and the season will soon end. Blackberries are most in evidence now, but supplies of even these are low today. They sell at \$1.25 to \$1.50 per crate. Some wild blackberries have come in, but receipts were not so large as dealers expected. They bring about the same price as the tame product.

Eggs Shrink Badly These Days
Commission men urge their country shippers to lose no time in forwarding eggs to market, for the hot weather has a damaging effect on the product. They say shippers should hold them no longer than is absolutely necessary, small and prompt shipments being preferred to larger lots delayed in making up. Close candling results in serious shrinkage in practically all lots now being received from valley points. Prices have not changed since yesterday, and the market is weak.

Hogs Are Scarce.
Weather conditions at this time are against hog shipments even for a small distance outside the city. It is practically out of reason for packers to bring Eastern hogs into the Pacific coast markets. The small supplies have therefore left them without the usual light requirements for this time of year.

A feature of special interest in the hog market at this time is the fact that no arrivals were shown in the local yards either for today, last Tuesday, a year ago, or two years ago today.

Cattle Are Just Steady.
At the recent drop of 25c in cattle prices the local market is quite able to hold its own and for specially selected top stuff a fractional advance over \$3.75 is some times obtained.
