LOCAL NEWS OF BUSTLING JUNCTION CITY

PROPOSITION TO ENLARGE PRESENT SCHOOL BUILDING DEFEATED AT SPECIAL ELECTION—MAJORITY SEEMS TO FAVOR NEW BUILDING—LOCAL AND PERSONAL NOTES.

The proposition to build a four-room annex to the present school building was defeated at the special election Wednesday. Several reasons were advanced that caused the defeat of the measure, principally that the word "annex" was used. It was considered impracticable to build a four-room annex and the board was powerless to act outside of the proposition, and in addition to that, the bonds could not be placed unless the law was strictly complied with.

More room is absolutely necessary, and much talk is indulged in as to the propriety of buying another block and duplicating the present building. We are in favor of a new and separate building or a two-room annex to the present building.

WAR ON WEEDS IS BEING WAGED AROUND CAMPUS

Captain Briggs, superintendent of the university grounds, is making a hard fight to conquer the weeds that abound on the campus and around its borders. "Never before," says the captain, "have I seen such a lot." Last winter three or four lawns were torn up and replowed, and this winter more will have to be spaded or plowed. Some of the lawns were so bad that replanting could not be done at once, but the earth had to be frequently run over with a disc plow until the weeds have been killed out. At the present time two of the lawns are so full of plantain that the clover and grass have no show at all.

The part of the campus that is not in lawns was put in oats last year to kill the thistles and weeds. This fall the land will be worked up into lawns, which will improve the appearance of the university one hundred per cent.
