HAVE NUMBER OF NEW GOOD
MEN FOR TOMORROW'S BAT-
TLE—BLUES ARE DETERMIN-
ED TO WIN AT LEAST ONE
GAME AND IMPORT CRACK
PLAYERS FROM PORTLAND**

If you do not attend the big baseball game tomorrow afternoon between the Colts and Springfield Blue at Recreation Park you will be sorry, for it is to be the biggest game of the season by far and all of your friends will be there. There never were two teams more evenly matched than the Blues and the Colts. These teams have been up against each other three times and each time the Colts have won, but by a very narrow margin. The first game, which was played on June 23, resulted in a 6-5 score; the second one, played on the 4th of July, resulted in a score of 2 to 2, and the last game, played on July 7, was won by Eugene, 3 to 1. By just a glance at the above scores the public can see that these teams are playing tip top ball. Since the last game both teams have been strengthened materially. The Blues have signed Charles Tallafiero, the big fellow who pitched such remarkable ball for the same team last year. As a pitcher for speed he has few equals, and the way he handed it out to Coburg last Sunday to the tune of 15 to 1 was a caution. Other new players who will appear in Springfield uniforms tomorrow are Cas Campbell at third and McClellan at short. These men are very fast and heady players, and will no doubt do great work around their respective stations. Behind the bat will be found Carl King, the best little backstop in the league, and on first and second respectively will be found "Red" Peret and Sid Smith, two of the fastest base runners in the league. The outfield will be well taken care of in the persons of Elmer Paine, Willey Humphrey and Grover Keatley. These men are all very fast and sure on fly balls. The Colts, under the watchful eye of McCormick, between the Colts and Springfield Blues also signed some western stars who will appear on the diamond tomorrow. Carl Hill, the heavy hitting first baseman, formerly of The Dallas team, will hold down the same position for the Colts, while Edwards and Wess Whitaker will play second and third respectively. These two men are good hitters and field very fast, and together with Wistar Johnson, who will be down from Portland to play short, will make a very formidable infield. Every one knows what Fred DeNeffe can do on the pitcher's mound, and he sure means to keep up his reputation in tomorrow's contest. He is without doubt the best amateur pitcher in Oregon, and with big Ralph Weed to receive his twists and straight ones, the fans will sure get their money's worth. In the outfield will be stationed big "Rube" Saunders, the heavy hitting kid, Harry Hobbs, the man with an awful whipl, and Moshberger, the home run hitter. Taken all around the two teams never were so strong at the same time and may the best team win.

**LANE WILL PRODUCE
SAME AS LAST YEAR**
According to the estimate of local hop experts the hop crop for this year for Oregon will be in the neighborhood of 140,000 bales, and Lane county is expected to produce about the same as last year, some 10,000 bales. The vine seems to be in good shape, and the lice not bad except in districts. Spraying seems to be very successful in killing them.

Lane county growers are not in the habit of contracting their hops, and as prices offered are low, no contracts so far as known have been made. Some of the growers are a little bit despondent over the outlook, and have let their yards fall off in condition. They figure that help is so high in price that there is no money in cultivating the yards particularly well.

**JUDGE LANDIS
FINES OIL TRUST**

cret of the company which its counsel were either unable or unwilling to tell. The judge found that Mr. Rockefeller knew very little about the affairs of the company, of which he is the president, and that little he was not sure of. He divulged, however, that the capital of the Standard Oil Company of New Jersey, is about \$100,000,000, and that its annual dividends now are "about 40 per cent."

**PRESIDENT OF TRUST
MAKES STATEMENT**

New York, Aug. 3.—President J. A. Moffatt, of the Standard Oil Company of Indiana, discussing the judgment of Judge Landis, said:

"The contention of the government was that the lawful rate was 18 cents a hundred pounds between Whiting and East St. Louis. The defendant claims, first, that the lawful rate was 6 cents, and, secondly, if 6 cents was not the lawful rate it was the rate issued to the Standard Oil Company by the Alton railroad as the lawful rate, and the Standard Oil Company was justified in believing from its own information, and from information received from the railroad company, that 6 cents was the lawful rate. The 18-cent rate was a 'class' and not a 'commodity' rate, and the chairman of the Chicago & St. Louis tariff association, testifying that they never applied it and never intended to apply it to oil. Moffatt claims that thousands of tons of freight were shipped under the same circumstances during the past fifteen years and that if the Standard Oil Company is guilty, so is practically every other shipper of that great manufacturing territory."

Moffatt continued:
"The uncontradicted evidence showed the Standard Oil Company was advised by the rate clerk of the Chicago & Alton that this six cent rate was filed with the Interstate commerce commission."

"The court, however, instructed the jury that the shipper must know not only what the rate was but also that such rate was actually filed with the Interstate commerce commission, that is to say, that the view of the court was that a shipper must know absolutely what was the legal rate at the risk of suffering enormous penalties in the event either that he was misinformed by the railroad company, or that in the event that he did not exercise as much diligence in the judgment of the courts as he should have exercised in ascertaining what the rate really was."

If this is the law every shipper of freight is in danger of the penitentiary or confiscation of his property by way of excessive fines every time he undertakes to make a shipment from one state to another."

"Knowing that the rate on the Western Illinois was but six cents, having no reason for shipping over the Alton in preference to the Eastern Illinois, and able to ship all of its oil over the latter road, we insist that the facts, many of which the court did not permit us to show, not alone demonstrate innocence, but inherently forbid the idea of guilt."

"We further insist that whatever may be one's technical view of the above questions, every equitable consideration is with the defendant, and if the only desire was to give the defendant a 'square deal' this prosecution would never have been instituted."

"The American public not only believes in fair play in the abstract, but with all the facts before it, it has the capacity to determine whether a defendant, rich or poor, has received a 'square deal.'"

"For all these reasons the Standard Oil Company asserts that it is not even technically guilty and that it ought never to have been prosecuted because of the claimed failure of a railroad company—which has neither been indicted or prosecuted—to file its tariff, and that the prosecution of this defendant under the circumstances of this case is a prostitution of the spirit and the high purpose of the Interstate commerce act."

**FISH TRUST MUST
ANSWER FOR REBATING**

Chicago, Aug. 3.—Indictments were returned today in the United States district court against Booth & Company, generally known as the "fish trust," the New York, Chicago & St. Louis railroad, and the Lehigh Valley railroad company, charging violation of the first provision of the Elkins law prohibiting rebates.
