### ORGANIZE SIUSLAW RAILROAD COMPANY NOW

The Siuslaw railroad committee should without further delay issue notice to the local stockholders for a meeting for the purpose of organization. This will enable them to organize and incorporate at an early date, placing in the hands of a board of directors the power to go ahead with the financing and building of the road. A small assessment will enable them to complete the survey for the first thirty mile section of the road, and to secure the right-of-way yet this fall. By early spring, with \$60,000 of stock pledged, there will be no particular difficulty in arranging for additional funds, and the work of construction can be commenced and carried on without interruption until completed.

There is no need to delay action longer, awaiting anybody's pleasure. Mr. Carver's proposition may be carried out if he still desires to go ahead—if not Eugene and Lane county are perfectly able to build the road as originally planned. The people here went into the movement in good faith and they have not the slightest intention of dropping it at this stage of the proceedings.

"On to the Siuslaw" is the battle cry of every Eugene booster—and we're all boosters now!

They have a curious case, quite after the Harry Orchard order, on Long Island. A Queens county grand jury in that state has twice refused to find an indictment against a man who, on different occasions, has confessed to a murder. Last May a girl named Stafford was killed. ## WILL GROW MUSHROOMS FOR OREGON MARKET

Ed Briggs, the night clerk at the Hoffman House, has a farm six miles from Eugene which he plans to turn into a mushroom garden next year. He intended to raise his first crop this year, but owing to delays did not get his beds in shape. However, as most of the preparation is made, comparatively little work will be needed to start a crop.

Mushroom growing, as far as catering to the market is concerned, is a new industry in Lane county, and with Portland within 125 miles and other good-sized Willamette valley towns nearer, there is every reason to suppose that the lovers of the mushroom will buy the product gladly. Near Paris there are hundreds of such farms. The distinct advantage of the cultivated mushroom is that there is no danger of eating a poisonous species, some of which are deadly. Mr. Briggs plans to produce all the standard varieties, and as soon as he can sell the stools should have his fortune made.

## GAME WARDENS FOR WESTERN LANE APPOINTED

Acme Sawmill Will Close Down This Week—House Burns at Mapleton—Salmon Fishermen Must Number Their Nets—Shipping Notes

The state board of forestry which was created by act of legislature last winter has appointed the following deputy fire wardens in this vicinity: W. E. Potter, Mapleton; Martin Noffsinger, Acme; C. O. Etchler, Minerva; Arthur Austin, Glendale; P. L. Tucker, Reed; Lucien Johnson, Earl; Ovie Dowell, Mercer; W. R. Jephcott, Florence; Conrad Townsend, Ruby; W. W. Neely, Mapleton. Persons desiring to obtain permits to burn slashings or other fires can apply to these deputies, who are authorized to issue permits if they deem it safe.

Last Monday the house occupied by Rev. M. W. Phelps at Mapleton was burned to the ground.

The Siuslaw Lumber Company's mill at Acme will close down within a day or two for an indefinite time. The company has several million feet of lumber on its wharf, and will probably not start up again until they get some of this shipped out.

Salmon fishermen, who are obliged to pay licenses, are compelled to put their license number upon their nets and corks, as well as upon their boat, according to a recent order of Master Fish Warden Van Dusen.

The schooner Sausalito, 33 days out from San Francisco, was towed in yesterday morning and is loading at the Oregon & California Lumber Company's mill.

The schooner was towed out to sea last Sunday with another cargo from the Siuslaw Lumber Company's mill.

The schooner Mayflower left for San Francisco last Saturday with a cargo of lumber from the Acme mills.

The schooner Albion left Monday afternoon for San Francisco with a cargo of lumber for the city market.—Florence West.
