FRENCH WARSHIPS OPEN GUNS UPON CASA BLANCO MOORS

Tangier, Aug. 6.—The French cruiser Galilee was bombarding the Moorish quarter of Casa Blanca when the last steamer, which arrived here today, left that port. The Kabyles attacked Casa Blanca and the Moorish authorities appealed to the commander of the Galilee for assistance. He landed 60 men and a Spanish cruiser landed forty. The landing party was fired upon by the Kabyles and seven Frenchmen were wounded. The combined Franco-Spanish force thereupon cleared the city of the hostile tribesmen. Guards were placed around the consulates and the bombardment commenced.

TWO FRENCH WARSHIPS DESTROY NATIVE VILLAGES

London, Aug. 6.—A dispatch from Tangier says that the French cruiser DuChayla also participated in the

bombardment of Casa Blanca, the native villages being destroyed. During the bombardment a battery of Casa Blanca opened fire on the warships, which returned the fire, causing the Moorish commander to cease and send a messenger asking the pardon of the French commander, which was refused. He was ordered to report to the French consul.

A later dispatch reports 150 Moors killed in and around Casa Blanca during the bombardment.

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JAP OFFICER SAYS STOESEL DESERVES HONOR

Paris, Aug. 6.—Captain Tsuneda, the Japanese military attaché here, who, while upon the staff of General Nogli, conducted negotiations for the surrender of Port Arthur, in an open letter defends General Stoessel, defender of the fortress, upon the eve of the latter's courtmartial for surrendering to the Japanese. All the Russian food, he says, was exhausted and twenty thousand Russians under arms were in no condition to fight. They might have held out two weeks longer, but it would have meant inevitable slaughter. Japan lost sixty thousand lives by gunfire alone.

Japan honors Stoessel's bravery and Tsuneda points out that Russia should treat him likewise.

THE HAGUE FARCE GROWING DAILY MORE IDIOTIC

The Hague, Aug. 6.—The question of the limitation of armament, brought before the peace conference by Great Britain, has been definitely solved, the British representatives having agreed to modify the proposition in accordance with the desire of Germany. The modified proposition, instead of urging limitation of armaments, says that such limitation is "highly desirable." This will be unanimously accepted.

YOUNG OFFICER STRANGELY MISSING

New York, Aug. 6.—Henry F. Lynch, United States marine on the battleship Georgia, lying at anchor in the Hudson, is strangely missing from the ship. The officers say that Lynch toppled over the side while hanging a light on Saturday night, but Daniel Lynch, his father, believes his son, who was to have been a witness at the investigation of the explosion on the battleship Georgia, met foul play. He has asked the government to investigate.

PEARY SAILS IN FEW DAYS TO FAR NORTH

Portland, Me., Aug. 5.—Commander Robert E. Peary left here today for New York, whence he will sail in a few days on an expedition to the North Pole. Commander Peary said today:

"From New York I shall go direct to Sidney, B. C., where I shall coal, and there will be no stops on the way, as I have no time to lose. "My crew this time will be practically the same as on my last trip. Captain Robert Bartlett is to command the Roosevelt. I am going prepared to make every effort to reach the pole. If I do succeed next summer, I shall stay over one year. If I do not succeed I shall stay one year

BEST ARRESTED FOR PRACTICING WITHOUT LICENSE

A warrant was issued last night for the arrest of W. E. Best, of Cottage Grove, for practicing medicine without a license, and Constable Plank went up immediately and made the arrest. The prosecuting witness is B. R. Job, of the South Lane city, and the trial has been set for Friday morning in the justice court.

Once before the doctor, who is very well known in and around Cottage Grove, was brought to this city for trial on the same charge, but the jury acquitted him.

The doctor claimed that he did not charge anything for his services. He said he was wealthy, and that his check would probably be honored for \$15,000. In the cases where charges had been made through him, he said he turned it over to other physicians, from whose offices the cases had been given him.

LAWYERS FIGHT IN GLASS CASE

San Francisco, Aug. 6.—During the examination of talesmen for jurors in the Halsey bribery case today Attorney Hiram Johnson for the prosecution and Attorney Bert Schlessinger, for the defense, called each other rogues and indulged in a fist fight. The only person hurt, however, was Assistant District Attorney William H. Cook, whose nose got in the way of the fists of both warring lawyers. They apologized to the court after the bout ended.

AMATEUR SWIMMER MAKES NEW RECORD

Dover, Eng., Aug. 6.—Jabez Wolff, an amateur swimmer, in his fifth attempt to swim the English channel, accomplished a record swim by getting within three-quarters of a mile of Cape Blanc, France, in fifteen and a half hours, when the turning tide carried him from the land, causing a relinquishment of the attempt.

SIX WERE KILLED EIGHTEEN INJURED

Pittsburg, Aug. 6.—The Titusville express, southbound, on the Pennsylvania railroad, was wrecked near Kelly station, ten miles from Kittanning, Pa., today. At least six people were killed and about eighteen injured.

MURDERED BY UNKNOWN PARTIES

The Dallas, Or., Aug. 6.—The coroner's jury investigating the mysterious death of Ernest Bonami, who was murdered while sleeping in a tent near Mill Creek, returned a verdict that he was murdered by unknown parties. So far there is no definite clue, but the authorities have been given the names of three enemies, two of whom had sworn to kill Bonami.

INVASION REPORT OFFICIALLY DENIED

Superior, Aug. 6.—Officers of the Canadian passenger boat say the reported "invasion" of Isle Royal by Captain Young, of Port Arthur, is a hoax. It is said to be a lack of some young Canadian enthusiasts, who went to the island in a launch flying the Union Jack.

CRIME WAVE STILL CONTINUES IN GOTHAM

New York, August 5.—The wave of crime continues. Miss Adelaide Wilder was attacked by a man but fought him off with her hat pin in a desperate struggle. Her assailant ran to Central Park, where he was captured. He is an Italian.
