MOVING TOWARD

BATTLE GROUND

Klamath Falls, Or., Aug. 5.—Engineer Journey and his assistants have already moved camp and are in the Bonanza county, having finished their survey from Klamath Falls through the Lost River gap. They are working east from here to Lakeview, and it is said they are a division of the forces now battling for the large territory in Eastern Oregon now without railroad transportation.

Engineer Journey's arrival, together with the announcement that rails have been ordered removed from the Coos Bay road to the California & Northeastern railway and work rushed on the latter have awakened a great deal of interest in railroad matters. Further, it is announced that the California & Northeastern will commence shortly on the deep cut

just north of this city, as this will furnish the material for the fill east of the city.

The deeds have been delivered to the Southern Pacific and the money paid over to Abel Ady, George W. White and Leo S. Robinson for the right-of-way over six miles of their swamp lands below this city. This is the closing act of what appeared at one time to become a source of trouble and delay. Altogether railroad matters seem to be progressing favorably for the people of this section.

It is said now that Mr. Coleman has more fully determined to build and if the bids come within reasonable limits will have operations begun at once. This will be the largest three-story building in town when the projected improvements are made.

Architect Hunzicker has plans for a two story cottage for Fred Stump. On the lower floor will be three full rooms and upstairs four.

Mrs. Idaho Campbell, who is at Heceta, is building a cottage there for her summer home. She is the wife of a former editor of this paper.

Miss Vira Stuart, winner of the Oregon Journal beauty contest, is back for her Jamestown trip. Friends of hers here say she had a splendid trip.

The shooting gallery on the east side of Willamette street between Eighth and Ninth was dismantled today. The proprietor will move it to Seaside.

Nelson Byron Carpenter, an insane person committed February 20, 1905, died in the asylum Aug. 3, 1907. Notice was received today by County Judge Chrisman.

Some personal property which was rescued from the fire disappeared afterward.
