RELIGIOUS WORKERS OF NEW SECT STIR NUTMEG STATE

Greenwich, Conn., Aug. 7.—The residents of the village of Greenwich and the nearby hamlet of Greeley are stirred up over the advent of a man and woman calling themselves missionaries of the "Apostolic Faith." Their revival meetings are well attended and stories of witchcraft and hypnotism have so inflamed the countryfolk that several mobs are gathered and a bomb was thrown into a room in which a meeting was held. The bomb was filled with liquid, which burned the missionaries. Another mob tore down their tent and burned it. The missionaries give their names as Brother Adolph DeRosa, a Portuguese, and Sister Lucy M. Leather-

man, formerly a missionary in the Holy Land. They deny the use of hypnotism and declare they will cease work in this field.

CHINESE ADOPTS WHITE BOY AS SON

Pottsville, Pa., Aug. 7.—Charles Sing, a Chinese laundryman, with the consent of the mother of Charles Hunt, a white boy, of Philadelphia, became the boy's foster father today. The boy's name was changed to Roy So Sing, and he becomes the legal heir of the laundryman. The grandmother and great-grandmother of the boy are parties to the arrangement also.

MISSISSIPPI VALLEY SUFFERS SEVERE STORMS

Chicago, Aug. 7.—Because of severe local storms in various sections of the Mississippi valley, telegraph facilities are greatly impaired.

Albert Lea, Minn., Aug. 7.—A tornado swept across Winnebago county, Iowa, late yesterday, and although the reports are conflicting it is known that one person was killed in Joice village, which was destroyed, and several injured. Some reports say that twenty were killed. The destruction of property is said to have been great.

Three Were Killed.
Mason City, Iowa, Aug. 7.—Three persons were killed and four injured and thousands of dollars of damage done in this section of the country Tuesday evening by a tornado.

PAIMER MILL AT
DRAIN BURNS DOWN
Drain, Or., Aug. 6.—The mills of

the Palmer Lumber Company, located one mile south of here on the S. P. railroad main line, were completely destroyed about one o'clock this morning from some unknown cause. The plant is a total loss, and about 50,000 feet of lumber in the yards and at least one railroad car were also destroyed. The mill was valued at about \$10,000, and the lumber was worth about the same amount. No insurance was carried on either.

DISTRICT ATTORNEY WILL STOP GAMING

Oregon City, Aug. 6.—District Attorney Hedges at 3 o'clock this afternoon reached the decision to stop gambling in all of the four counties of the district—Clackamas, Clatsop, Washington and Columbia. This means the end of gambling in Astoria. Instructions to that effect are being prepared this afternoon and will be mailed to his deputies as follows: Clatsop, J. C. McCue; Columbia, W. H. Powell; Washington, J. M. Wall. Mr. Hedges will act personally in the case of Clackamas county.

The shower this afternoon, if it continues drizzling, will do some damage to crops, according to some farmers. All the grain is outside, very little having been threshed.

CITIZENS DISCUS FIRE LIMITS AND CEMENT WALKS

WANT FIRE LIMITS EXTENDED
OVER BUSINESS DISTRICT—CEMENT WALK ORDINANCE FOR BUSINESS AND BEST RESIDENCE SECTIONS—COUNCIL MEETS TONIGHT TO CONSIDER THESE AND OTHER MATTERS

The meeting of the citizens last night in the city hall brought forth in those present—the principal men of the city—a great deal of enthusiasm concerning the questions which arose, the extension of the fire limits to the depot and up Willamette street, and the passing of an ordinance to compel property owners to build cement sidewalks along Willamette street.

Dr. D. A. Paine opened the meeting, after which Geo. G. Gross was elected chairman and E. J. Moore secretary. Dr. Paine presented in detail the necessity for the extension of the fire limits so as to cover the business district from Eleventh street to the depot, and from Charnelton to Pearl on Eighth street, and from Olive to Pearl on Ninth, Seventh and Sixth. He also said that cement sidewalks should be required in the shortest reasonable time all over the business district, and the best part of the residence district. F. W. Osburn and Geo. T. Hall Sr. endorsed Dr. Paine's views on the subject.

C. S. Frank found fault with the cement which is being put in the curbs, and recommended that the mixing be carefully watched. Mr. Mitchell and others talked along the same line, and City Engineer Waggoner expressed his inability to look closely after the mixing of the cement. This led to the suggestion that the city appoint a superintendent to look after this part of the street work.

At the end of the meeting Mayor Matlock made some of his usual timely suggestions. He thinks that the fire limits should not go farther south than Tenth street, so as not to subject the church properties between Tenth and Eleventh streets to the fire limit ordinance. He brought out especially the necessity of building cement sidewalks on Willamette

REFERENDUM CASES ARGUED AT SALEM TODAY

Salem, Or., Aug. 7.—Appeals in the three referendum cases from the decision of Judge Galloway, of the circuit court for Marion county, are being argued before the supreme court this afternoon. They are injunction suits against the secretary of state against the filing of petitions on the Multnomah county sheriff's act and compulsory pass act, and the mandamus suit to compel Secretary Benson to accept and file the petition for the referendum on the university appropriation act. It is believed the supreme court will endeavor to decide these cases before the fall recess, which will begin about the last of August.

TROOPS IN CHARGE OF DISTURBED CITY

Belfast, Aug. 7.—Troops took possession of the streets of Belfast today and strong guards were posted at the principal centres. The move is the result of strikes and the insubordination of the police. The town is quiet now.

MORE VICTIMS CLAIMED BY THE DEADLY AUTO

Milwaukee, Aug. 7.—Two persons were killed, one fatally and a fourth slightly injured in an automobile accident at Brookfield corners today. The dead are: Former Alderman Joseph Kuschert and George Poss, who died in the hospital; fatally injured, Horace George Sloan, son of a former Milwaukee judge; "Paddy" Dorrell, fight promoter and saloon-keeper, slightly injured. It is supposed that the steering gear became jammed, and at the turn of the road the machine overturned in a ditch.

WENDLING FIRE WAS A SLASHING

The fire which lighted up the northeastern sky so brightly last evening was only a slashing burning near camp No. 2, four miles from Wendling. While the blaze was of considerable height, the slashing being dry, the fire wardens are reported as having it under control this morning, without allowing it to do any damage. It did not get into the green timber at all, and though it is still burning all danger is thought to be past.

FLETCHER LINN PLANTS BIG FARM TO FRUIT

Fletcher Linn, who recently purchased the David Linn ranch west of this place, has a force of men at work clearing away the timber and shrubbery and intends planting the entire ranch to fruit trees and grapes, says the Jacksonville Post. He will plant about twenty acres in grapes and the balance of the land in various kinds of fruit trees. There are about 160 acres in the ranch. A bearing orchard of about 30 acres is already on the place, which brings in a tidy little revenue each year.

It handled over half the output of the ore of the Cripple Creek district, and the loss will approximate \$750,000, as it was the largest cyanide plant in the West. Insurance, \$300,000.
