VEIN OF COAL IS FIVE FEET IN WIDTH

George Jennings, vice president of the Spencer Butte coal mine, is in the city today, coming here from Eugene. The coal mine with which Mr. Jennings is connected is located a few miles southwest of Eugene, and was discovered about a year ago. According to Mr. Jennings, the mine has excellent prospects. The coal which is found there is of a much better quality than that on Coos Bay. It is practically free from sulphur, making it an excellent fuel material. At present, a shaft is being sunk and already the workmen have struck three veins of excellent coal. The third vein, which was struck a few days ago, is five feet in width. Albany Herald.

Chicago, Aug. 5.—Judge Landis, in the United States district court today, ordered the dissolution of the Church and School Furniture Trust recently published by fines amounting to \$43,000 for admitted violation of the anti-trust laws. The court entered a decree making permanent the injunction recently granted against the company, which was recently fined, restraining it from further trust agreements or conspiracies to monopolize and restrain the trade in violation of law.

LANE COUNTY IS SHORT ON SCHOOL "MAM'S"

DISTRICTS MAY HAVE DIFFICULTY IN SUPPLYING VACANCIES. LOW SALARIES THE CAUSE—EXAMINATIONS AUGUST 14 AND ABOUT SIXTY APPLICANTS ARE EXPECTED

Lane county will be short this year in school teachers, and it will not be unlikely that some of the districts will not be able to obtain pedagogues at all. About 250 teachers are required and from the present outlook a couple of score will not be found. What makes the situation worse is that the same predicament exists all over the state, and the only remedy seems to be an increase in the salary of the teachers so that capable men and women may be induced to take up the profession and stay with it.

An increase in normal schools will not help the supply of teachers, either, because as soon as a graduate from them or any other institution is through with their preparation, they find they can make far more money in some other occupation. As a result many of the teachers who obtain positions are not thoroughly capable, though they pass the examinations in some sort of fashion.

County Superintendent W. B. Dillard states that he expects about sixty applicants at the examinations next week, but a good portion of these will be old ones trying for new certificates or higher papers. The examinations begin August 14 and close August 17.

Many of last year's teachers in the county will not be in the ranks this year, for marriage has given them what they consider better positions.

WILL FORCE RAILROAD TO OBEY STATE LAWS

Birmingham, Ala., Aug. 5.—It is not unlikely that troops will be ordered out within a few days to take possession of the line of the Southern railway, the cancellation of whose license to operate in the state is being ignored by the company. A four-hour conference held here this afternoon between Governor Comer, Attorney-General Garber and prominent attorneys, including two ex-chief justices of the state supreme court, is believed to have resulted in a determination to make wholesale arrests of officials of the Southern road if that company does not recede from its present position.

A state official close to the governor made the statement that Governor Comer was going to use every power at his command to make the Southern railway obey the laws of Alabama.
