DURING JULY MORE DEATHS THAN BIRTHS

COUNTY'S HEALTH IS VERY GOOD—FIFTEEN CONTAGIOUS DISEASES DURING JULY—SIX OF DIPHTHERIA, ONE FATAL—FOUR OF MEASLES, ONE FATAL—NINE DIED AT COTTAGE GROVE

The deaths in Lane county during July numbered twenty-two, while the births were only twenty, according to Dr. J. W. Harris, the county health officer. There were during the month fifteen cases of contagious disease.

Of the births the total was exactly divided between male and female. In the way the stark proportioned the little tots Springfield tied with Eugene, with seven, for first place. No other place in the county was given more than one. Those which were favored were Pleasant Hill, Natron, Lancaster, Junction, Florence, and one to the county at large.

Of the fifteen causes of disease there was just one case of typhoid, and that in Eugene. Of diphtheria there were six, two at Cottage Grove, and four seven miles west of Cottage Grove, in a family by the name of Grapp. One of these cases, a boy by the name of Alexander, died. Junction City had three cases of measles, one of which was fatal. Another case was also reported. There were two cases of membranous croup, one of scarlet fever and one of tuberculosis.

In the record of deaths Cottage Grove and vicinity stood highest, with nine. Eugene had four, Junction City three, Lorane two and the county in general two, Glenada one and London one.
