S. P. BUSINESS INCREASED AT LEAST 10 PER CENT

BUSINESS ON RAILROAD INCREASING IN BOTH FREIGHT AND PASSENGER TRAFFIC—GENERAL TRAFFIC GROWS HEAVIER—WILL BE STILL GREATER NEXT YEAR FROM PRESENT OUTLOOK

The business of the railroad here in Eugene this year has had an increase of over ten per cent over what it was last year in both passenger traffic and freight business. Agent A. J. Gillette has had his work increased considerably this year, but prophesies that by next year the business will have a still greater percentage of increase.

This growth is not surprising, since the whole country has advanced in about that proportion during the last year. The railroad business, too, in a general way, is much larger, and while the Southern Pacific has put on passenger trains, and brought in bigger engines, especially for the freight traffic, the company has difficulty in keeping up with the demands upon it, and is considering, according to outside reports, putting on another through passenger train and an express and mail train. The latter was definitely announced yesterday from Portland, and is a move along the lines followed by transcontinental roads and others in the East.

There is only one thing that can hold back the traffic of Lane county, and that is the proposed increase in rates on lumber. That would affect the lumber mills most vitally, and therefore indirectly every individual in the county. However, as a hard fight will be made against the proposed tariff, the railroads are not likely to carry their announced intention to consummate.

Business continues good on the Willamette train. While the cost of tickets is small, the railroad men in the local office have a great deal of extra labor.

HOW TO MARK YOUR SPECIAL DELIVERY LETTER

Postmasters are calling attention to a postoffice regulation the neglect of which delays instead of hastens the delivery of a letter. Under a rule recently promulgated it is provided that by affixing ten cents in stamps additional on a letter and on the envelope, the letter will be given special delivery. But there is another and older rule under which the department registers a letter if it is overpaid eight cents. It is stated that it has frequently happened that a person wishing to take advantage of the special delivery rule has mailed his letter without writing on it the words "special delivery." In that case the letter is registered and thus delayed.

EXPRESS TRAIN SERVICE ON OREGON ROAD

San Francisco, August 6.—General Manager E. E. Calvin issued orders today to put express train service on all lines out of San Francisco and within a week this will be installed to Portland, to El Paso and to Los Angeles. There is a train already in operation between here and Ogden that has brought such good results that the general manager has decided that the service be extended.

At present it has been decided to have only one train each way a day. They will not stop at every small station along the line; only at important points. They will carry perhaps a limited amount of mail, but this has not been fully agreed upon. They will also relieve some of the passenger trains of baggage, as many of the overland trains have to carry extra cars for baggage and mail, which makes it difficult for them to maintain schedules.

Portland, Aug. 6.—General Manager O'Brien confirmed the news contained in the above dispatch last night. He said:

"An express train service for the accommodation of express and baggage alone to care for the heavy business now offering between Portland and San Francisco is planned. We have had several conferences on this subject, but I cannot tell yet just when the new service will be started nor give the schedule.

It is possible that this train may also take some passenger equipment in order to relieve the regular overland trains, which are very heavy. As to this I cannot say yet."

CITY NEWS.

The state pay for the members of the O. N. G. who went to Fort Stevens has arrived and the captains desire to get it off their hands.

A settlement in the case of A. R. Martin vs. the City of Junction for the costs has been agreed upon between the two parties for \$59.50.

The block on Willamette street between Sixth and Seventh streets is without sidewalks and the middle of the road is becoming quite muddy.

Constable Plank has returned from a trip to Drain and Cottage Grove, where he subpoenaed a number of witnesses in the Best case. The prosecution believes it has a strong case.

The county commissioners met today and passed upon a number of bills. Road viewers were also appointed for the selection of four new highways in various parts of the county.

Twelve hunters' licenses were issued today in the county clerk's office. Two of the applicants were six feet five inches, one six feet two, one six feet and two five feet ten, and one five feet ten and a half. It was a tall man's day indeed.

All of the money to send Dan Kelly to Jamestown is raised, and he and Hayward are working hard so the he may be in the finest trim. They will leave about Aug. 22 for the fair, the races coming off about September 7. Parsons will probably be his hardest man.

Will Kelsay, who has been visiting on the Mohawk, was in town today. The reports of the fire here Monday that first got up there stated that practically all of the block went, and the skating rink. The fire at camp No. 2, near Wendling, he says, has spread over a good part of the mountain.

Julius Goldsmith is moving a large portion of his cigar and tobacco stock to the new location, but will keep a smaller stand in the room where Nadeau's shooting gallery is now located. The Bushnell-Crane Real Estate Company has sold the A. J. Mack place, seven miles west of town, to Frank Clink. Mr. Clink is one of the men who accompanied Mr. Crane from his trip to the East. Other deals are being made.

The Cumberland Presbyterian church building has been sold again to the Norwegian Lutheran church for \$2500. The church also gets a 60-foot front on Pearl street, which is 160 feet deep. This will enable them to build a parsonage.

J. W. Collier, the general Oregon agent for the Des Moines Life Insurance Company, has purchased a fine little bay mare and buggy from C. R. Mead, of Springfield. Paul Cowgill, who arrived here yesterday from Boise with his family, is Western field manager of the same company, and after a vacation on the McKenzie will work with Mr. Collier.

No women in Lane county have taken out hunting licenses this year yet, although several did last year. However, in the knowledge of every Oregonian there are many women who hunt, and it must be presumed that they dare to do so under the privilege granted by the license to their husbands. So far 636 licenses have been granted, but they are all to the masculine sex.
