TWO GAMES OF BASEBALL ON SUNDAY

Everyone is preparing to take in the two big baseball games tomorrow afternoon at Springfield, and from present indications there promises to be a record breaking crowd in attendance. The games will be played between two of the fastest teams in southern Oregon—the Drain Athletics and Springfield Blues. Local baseball fans know what the Springfield team can do without the writer going into details, and on paper the Drain team is just as good. The only way to compare the relative strength of the teams is by the games they have played with the speedy Roseburg Models. Drain has played this team two games, and have come out victorious both times by the close scores of 3-1 and 3-0. About a month ago the Models journeyed to Springfield, and for eight innings held the hard-hitting Blues down to a row of goose eggs, while they in turn annexed one run to their credit in the fifth inning. However, in the last of the ninth the Blues sent a brace of runs over the plate, thereby winning the game by the close score of 2-1. The Drain team is composed mostly of eastern college men, who are doing the surveying on the Drain-Coos Bay railroad. In Murphy and Moore they have a battery hard to beat. Tomorrow's games will be the first attempt at playing two games in one afternoon. The first game will begin promptly at 2 o'clock and the second game will begin immediately after the conclusion of the first. The Colts will journey to Coburg and will again take them into camp, as DeNeffe will pitch and Weed will catch. Thirty-five cents admission will be charged for both of the games at Springfield. SEVENTY-FIVE MEN EMPLOYED ON STREETS

TEN HOUR LAW NOT SERIOUSLY VIOLATED HERE

The Eugene merchants who employ women clerks chiefly, state that the observance of the ten hour law will not discommode them in any way. Furthermore, the merchants have not been breaking the law, at least, seriously or regularly, and have no reason at all for not desiring the rules to be followed literally. The Eugene clerks go to work at eight o'clock five days, and quit at six o'clock on every day but Saturday, when they work until nine o'clock. It is the intention of the stores to have the clerks that will work evenings come on at nine o'clock, and thus avoid all conflict with the law. The laundries have more or less frequently worked their employees overtime, when they had no objections, and consider the statement made that most of the business men and laundries, with the list of other establishments that come under the law, as rather personal. They claim that the only law that they were aware of, was one that prohibited working their employees more than sixty hours a week, which they assert they have never broken. Generally speaking, in any cases where any law was broken, the case was not serious and but very little difficulty will be caused by its strict enforcement.
