AUTOMOBILES HAVE NOT HURT HORSE BUSINESS

ALBERTA, CANADA, GREATEST HORSE MARKET IN COUNTRY—HORSES WILL ALWAYS BE HIGH—FINE CHANCE FOR YOUNG MEN—FARMERS TAKE ANY KIND THAT WILL WORK

Automobiles have not driven the horse out of his sphere one whit, says E. C. Smith, the veteran horse buyer, who is in the city with a drove of horses, most of which have been sold. Today the horse is a scarcer article and higher in Eastern Oregon than in Western Oregon. Mr. Smith brought a drove of horses from Eastern Oregon through the Willamette valley, and says he finds he could have sold his bunch at Shaniko for more money than he has received on the venture in this valley.

Some years ago horsemen became frightened over the oft-repeated prophecy that the horse in fifteen years would be a thing of the past, generally speaking, and for three or four years very few horses were raised. Since then, however, the demand has been so great that the buyers pick up the kind that used to go to the canneries, and are glad to get them.

The whole West has grown and with the new growth all of the surplus horses have been used up by farmers who want teams. Alberta, in Canada, is the greatest horse market in the world, and the new settlers there could handle fifty thousand horses, according to Mr. Smith. They don't care whether they are big horses, little horses or ponies, but want anything that will work. The United States cannot supply the demand, and the horses are going up in price, and will go still higher.

This summer thirty cars of Eastern Oregon animals have gone to Nebraska, the young ones to work on the farms, and the brood mares to raise mules.

As a result on these depredations on the ranges of Oregon, horses are becoming very high in the eastern section, the renowned home of cheap horses. Where men were accustomed to buy good riding horses across the mountains for \$5 and \$10, they are now obliged to pay as much as the people do here, and some times more.

These things, claims Mr. Smith, who has traveled all over the country in the horse business, make the business a very fine one now, and a young man has an unexampled chance to make his fortune doing nothing but raising horses for the market of the country.

"If I were a young man," said Mr. Smith, "I would go where there was still lots of range and invest in horses. The horse will never lose its place because of the automobile, and each year will make him worth more."

The best kind of all around horses in this horseman's mind is the Norman Percheron. He has the best bone and suits the most purposes.

Mr. Smith leaves tonight for Seattle. He leaves about seventeen horses here at the Eugene Transfer Company's barn which are yet to be sold.

VITRIFIED BRICK BEING PLACED BETWEEN RAILS

Vitrified brick are being placed between the rails of the street car tracks near the Cross Hotel on top of the "blinder." The first half block of binder has been laid, and men are spreading the crushed rock for the bituminous pavement as fast as possible. On top of the brick a preparation will be put which finishes up the surface. The rails of the street car line are below the surface of the facing, the brick being molded for that purpose.

The street railway people are now working on Eleventh street, and have done plowing as far east as Patterson street. They are working much faster on that street than they did on Williams street. All of the gravel is tamped down very carefully and every rail and tie laid with the greatest care.

BIG POWER PLANT BEING SURVEYED

A corps of engineers from San Francisco, in the employ of some company at present unknown, have been at work since early in the summer on the electrical water power plant project at the head of the McKenzie river. Considerable work was done there last summer, and it is being continued this year. Besides surveying out a canal route and power house sites, roads are being laid out over which it is presumed heavy machinery of some kind is to be moved. The canal as surveyed is four to six miles in length, and takes water directly from Clear Lake, the source of the McKenzie, and conveys it to a point below the falls. The total drop in that distance is said to be nine hundred feet, and the power attainable under a full head of water, which can only be had in that lava formation by means of a cement canal, will be something immense. At one point the canal will be built by tunneling through a mountain.

It is presumed that the idea of the promoters is to furnish electric power for an electric line, perhaps across the mountains, and for factories.

IVISON HAS FINE CROP OF FRUIT AND VEGETABLES

J. S. Day, of Ivison, states that the peaches, prunes and apples of that vicinity are looking fine, and that the crops will be bountiful all over that vicinity in these fruits. The vegetable crops are also good. Cattle are also looking fine on the ranges, and with good prices some good beaves will be sold.

W. B. Smith, who formerly carried the star route between Hale and Ivison, has had to give up his place since the mail comes from Elmira now. Mr. Smith has carried the mail for five years without grumbling to the satisfaction of the entire community. J. D. Mays carries the Elmira route.

Mr. Day says that many men are trying to buy timber in his vicinity. One contest case is being tried before United States Commissioner W. W. Calkins today from that vicinity. The case is a contest over a homestead, Ray Littlefield being the plaintiff and Willis McGuire defendant.

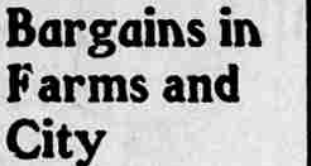
