## DANISH HIGH SCHOOL WILL BE BUILT AT JUNCTION

ORGANIZATION AFFECTED BY MEMBERS OF DANISH COLONY. BUILDINGS WILL COST \$25,000. LOCAL AND PERSONAL NOTES OF BUSY RAILROAD TOWN

Junction, Or., Aug. 13.—The members of the Danish colony at this place held a special meeting Sunday and completed a thorough organization of the plans to build the Danish high school.

They will be incorporated at once and commence to get the grounds in shape to build next spring. They expect to put up buildings to cost \$25,000, to start with, and will enlarge as needed.

The Danish people have only three such schools in the United States, and the one to be erected here is intended to draw students from Oregon, Washington, Idaho and California. They expect to teach all the higher branches of both English and Danish history. Hon. G. C. Millett has donated five acres of land for the school, which will be located just west of his beautiful home. The people are responding very liberally in getting it started. Hon. C. W. Washburne gave \$500. Mr. Millett, besides giving the land, has given \$250, and others are helping the good cause along.

## DEMURRAGE LAW MAY EFFECT FUEL MARKET

(Continued from Page 1.)

reasoned that the big sawmills, like those at Wendling, will be able to ship their wood into town, and will in a short time glut the market, so far as high prices are concerned.

Up to this time the prevailing prices wood have been very high, and the owners of cord wood who were placing it on the market were feeling very prosperous. Under this law now, however, cars of slabwood can be brought in at practically any time, and the consumer herewith undoubtedly get a great deal of relief, while those who have already put in their supply of fuel may lose considerable money.

The law provides for reciprocal demurrage, that works both ways, affecting railroad and shipper alike. Under the provisions of the law, if application is made for five cars or less, they must be supplied within five days; more than five cars, and not to exceed ten, within ten days; for more than ten cars, and less than 30, within 15 days; and if application is made for more than 30 cars, they must be furnished within 20 days. Time runs from 7 o'clock in the morning of the day following that on which application is made to the railroad company.

If the railroad company fails to furnish the cars within the time specified, it forfeits to the shipper \$2 a day and every fraction of a day for each car applied for. Here is where the reciprocal part of the law comes in:

"If a shipper fails to load the car supplied him within 48 hours after they are delivered ready for loading, he forfeits and must pay to the railroad company \$2 a day or fraction of a day for each car so delivered."

## ELECTRIC RAILWAY

the original L. B. French right-of-way. One traverses certain prominent residence streets through the residence section of the city, terminating at the river's brink, calculated to give an outlet to the system into Polk county. The other takes a river course through the city in a nearly direct line to the southern limits, and will connect in the vicinity of the reform school with the line that has already been surveyed and for which right-of-way has been secured from this city to Mehama.

The specific conditions named in the franchise are that work must be begun within six months after the granting of the franchise, and the entire road must be completed between this city and Albany within two years. This indicates that there is need of hurry in the completion of the project. Mr. Welch, who is at the head of the Willamette Valley Company, recently sold out his interests in the Eugene & Eastern to Storey and others, who are promoting a system of lines out of Eugene. He is devoting his entire efforts upon the present project, which contemplates a continuous system of electric railway from Portland to the southern boundary of the state, with laterals reaching out the most fertile sections of the valley, having no rail outlet to the principal markets. Two crews of surveyors will be placed in the field the first of the week and will complete the surveys, according to the designs of the promoters, as they proceed.

## WHAT THE STRIKERS ARE ASKING FOR

The commercial telegraph operators demand an increase in wages amounting to an average of 15 per cent of the present scale, free typewriters, an eight-hour day, and the recognition of the union. The telegraph companies recently raised the old wage scale ten per cent. The men, however, claim that the 10 per cent increase was not generally applied. The companies declare that it was made without discrimination, from the managers down to the lowest paid operators, including those in branch offices.
