SADIE CAUSED OPERATORS STRIKE SO THEY SAY

WOMAN OPERATOR'S KICK KNOCKED THE UNDERPINNING FROM TRADE—STOPPED BUSINESS ON STOCK MARKET AND PARALYZED COMMERCIAL LIFE EVERYWHERE

Ever since Adam was fired out of the Garden of Eden, in fact, as the cause of that, the first of all lock-outs, woman has been the source of trouble and tribulation. The old Hindoo legend, indeed, tells of the first pair, in which after man was given the woman he went back to the deity who gave her and asked him to take her back. He entered a complaint that she talked too much and annoyed him. She was taken back, but in a short time the man appeared again and asked to have her given back to him because, said he, "she prattles to me and amuses me, and her voice is soft and sweet and low, and lulls me to slumber, as does the whispering winds in the tree tops, and her laughter is as the music of falling waters and the touch of her fingers is as balm to my wounds. I would have her back, for I cannot live without her." She was given back, and in a week the man again appeared before the deity with the woman, and complained that she made life a burden to him, and said he could not live with her. "Neither can you live without her," said the deity, and so the man kept her.

This light dissertation itself has been caused by a woman, that woman being Mrs. Sadie Nichols, aged 46, or telegraph operator, and place of residence, West Oakland, California. She is the woman in the case, in the present telegraphers' strike, and she is liable to become as famous as was Mrs. O'Leary's cow, who kicked over a lantern and made Chicago an ash heap. The cow when she kicked had no intention of committing arson, and destroying the city, and Mrs. Nichols when she kicked, when she did, little suspected she was kicking the underpinning from the business of the country, yet such was the fact, for it was her kick that caused the strike that now has all business wearing crepe.

Mrs. Sadie Nichols, as we have said, is a lady of some 46 summers and a like amount of other seasons, and was employed at the West Oakland telegraph station as a "scab." She reported to her superior, that John Edgar Ryan, a union man, and an operator at Los Angeles, had insulted her over the wire for taking a union man's job. What Johnny said is, of course, unknown, but a long distance insult over the wire is not very serious, in fact the news associations insult the wires and the public daily by the hog wash sent over the help-less lines to the equally helpless newspapers which, if they don't get what they like have to like what they get. Anyway Sadie kicked, and as a result Ryan, of Los Angeles, was fired. His fellow operators, knowing the style and variety of badinage often passed between operators over the wires, thought his punishment was too severe and asked Ryan's reinstatement. This was refused and the strike followed. It was only a small blaze but the material was dry as tinder, and it took but little to fan it to a blaze. The result is business is paralyzed. Thousands are idle and millions of dollars are being lost because Sadie Nichols, aged 46, was talked to in a manner that hurt her little feelings. Of course it was wrong to insult Sadie, especially at so remote a distance, yet she had a right to kick. But it does seem that second thought would have made her hesitate about trying to run in opposition to Mrs. O'Leary's cow. Anyway her kick has borne bigger results than any on record except perhaps in the case of the cow mentioned, and that of Roger de Coverly, the mighty kicker, whose history is told by Robert Ingoldsby, who kicked a dead horse in the mouth, to his own undoing. What the end will be no man can foresee, but the Christian name of Sadie and surname of Nichols will be one long remembered by the business of the United States. Bonaparte went to war over a bucket, but this industrial battle has been caused by a few injudicious remarks made from a point so remote that hair pulling and scratching could not come to the aggrieved party's relief.

LANE AND LINN COUNTIES MAY BE QUARANTINED

Word comes from E. M. Hutchinson, federal sheep inspector, that the law requiring the dipping of sheep in the state is being pretty generally complied with, except in Lane and Linn counties, where the farmers and sheep raisers are inclined to evade it. He declares that this action may result in the quarantining of the two counties, and no sheep can then be shipped out or in. Some farmers in this vicinity have dipped their flocks according to law, but a large majority have refused or neglected to do so.

It seems unfortunate that any should try to evade compliance with the provisions of a law placed upon the statutes expressly for the benefit of the industry which they represent. It is impossible to pass a law relating to these things that will exactly please everyone, and yet be effective. It is a matter of the utmost importance to the sheep industry of our state that scab and all other contagious diseases be stamped out, to accomplish which is bound to work a hardship on some, but it is better that some extra expense should be incurred—that some sheep be dipped that may seem to be entirely clean—than that a few diseased ones should escape, and thus perpetuate the disease and thwart the purpose of the law. We are glad to learn that there is a good prospect of eradicating this loathsome, aggravating disease, and trust that for the general good of the industry all may fall in line, even though in some cases the sacrifice may seem unnecessary.—Rural Spirit.
