TRUST-BUSTING METHODS THAT ARE ABORTIVE

The net results of this trust-busting campaign after all amount to but little. The big combines go on doing business just the same in spite of petty fines. Only a few weeks ago it was announced that the paper trust had been dissolved because of the court proceedings against it, but yesterday's dispatches tell of a bigger and stronger paper mill merger than ever before. The truth seems to be that the trust never was dissolved, because the price of all kinds of news paper and job stock have been going steadily higher for the past year, as every publisher and printer well knows. The paper upon which The Guard is printed costs almost a cent a pound more than it did one year ago, and with the new merger effected by the paper mills prices will probably receive another boost.

It might not be amiss at this time, before the dust of the great presidential political battle obscures the area, to review the situation with regard to what has, or rather what has not, been accomplished in the way of making a beginning toward government control of corporations. I may be taken for granted that the period of radical legislation appears to be passing, and attempts are now being made to enforce new laws. The effort to enforce these laws is certain to result in more or less interference with business, and may bring to the attention of the country most forcibly some fundamental principle of our economic affairs.

The imposition of a fine upon the corporations found guilty of violating the laws of the country is bound to fail in its purpose if the offending corporations are in a position, by increasing the selling price of their products, to make the public bear the burden of the fines. Nothing short of fine and imprisonment applied to the heads of the guilty corporations can have the desired effect. Federal control of corporations, or even state control, will be totally inadequate unless the control extends to the men who establish and maintain the corporations. This is the only sensible view of the matter, but it is also the very view the politicians are interested in keeping in the background, for fear it might interfere with their designs upon the people and the offices within their gift. Hence it may be regarded as little short of a public calamity when a question involving a great economic principle becomes a campaign issue.

COLLEGE CLUBS ARE DRIVEN FROM PRINCETON

One of the most detrimental facts of the educational life of the United States, the college club, or fraternal society, seems now doomed to be abolished, is the opinion of the Pendleton East Oregonian. There is a determined movement against the aristocratic club among conservative college men, and it is to be sincerely hoped that their efforts will be successful.

The clubs have been the means of driving thousands of deserving young men away from college, simply because they could not suffer the sharp lines of caste drawn by the clubs. The Oregon Sunday Journal Magazine says of the subject:

"Possibly our young men may have to study at college in the future. Have you heard the dictum? Like a bombshell it has crashed from the quiet halls of Princeton. Like the valley of the Minute Men it will probably go on reverberating until heard around the world.

"Death to the club life which has been in so many cases one of the main incentives to attending America's largest colleges—this and the total abolition of caste, so dear to

the junior and senior, is what the thunders proclaim.

"A committee, of which President Woodrow Wilson is chairman, has so advised, and the idea has been adopted by the Princeton trustees, including ex-President Cleveland.

"According to this plan, either the thirteen college clubs at Princeton must be abolished, or the club houses must be turned over to the college, to be presided over by professors and to be occupied by the despised freshman and sophomore on terms of equality with the high-caste men who built and furnished them.

"One of these clubs represents \$125,000; others are nearly as luxurious; their aggregate value is nearly \$500,000. Membership in them is regarded as a greater distinction than taking class honors in studies. In fact, in the opinion of Dr. Wilson, the college has come to be a sort of toll to the club kites.

"Back of the Princeton innovation is a modern tendency to make a business of going to college, to abolish such romantic ideas as hazing and secret societies, and to substitute the methods of the corporation.

"Will the members of the student body submit or will they fight? This cannot be told until September, when the trustees and students try to 'get together' on the club question.

"Meanwhile undergraduates and graduates all over the country are excited to the eruptive point, for if the plan works at Princeton why should it not become general?"

Speaking of standing together and relegating "knockers" to the rear, why not stand back of the present city administration and help carry out their program for the building of a Greater Eugene? Never before was so much real permanent improvement being done, resulting in substantial growth and advancing prices of realty. Now the city fathers are asking the most important thing of all that the means be placed in their hands to provide a suitable water supply for present and future needs. Only knockers against the city's welfare oppose this plan, and it is time they took the hint and climbed onto the band wagon of progress before they are ground beneath its wheels. Eugene is bigger than any private corporation or individual.

The Salem Statesman calls attention to the rapid development of the Willamette valley in the following editorial paragraph: "While work is being rushed on the Salem-Portland line, many men laboring on the new road from Corvallis into the Alsea country, fast progress being made on the Eugene electric railway, it can be truthfully said that the central Willamette valley is going to the fore with a vengeance. Then take into consideration the contemplated new transportation facilities that we may have before many months as a result of the new franchise asked of the Salem city council."

Relative to the senatorial situation the Oregonian recently quoted Governor Chamberlain as follows: "I have not made up my mind in regard to running for the senate when my second term as governor has expired. If it were left to my own inclinations in the matter I would never run for any office again. My candidate for the senate is ex-Senator Gearin. I have urged him, but he seems reluctant to enter the contest. As for myself, I cannot say what I will do."

Ex-Governor W. L. Douglas, of Massachusetts, who is better known as the big shoemaker, is a good judge of advertising mediums, for he has tried all that are going. In speaking of newspapers and magazines he gives preference to the former. To find an ad in a magazine is like hunting a needle in a haystack. IT SEEMS TO ME THAT OUR TEXT BOOKS, OUR EXAMINATIONS AND OUR INSTRUCTION SHOULD GLORIFY THE ARTS OF PEACE ABOVE THE ART OF WAR.
