NOW FOR THE OPEN RIVER TO EUGENE

Senator Fulton declares he will work to secure the opening of the Willamette river by federal appropriation from Eugene to the Columbia. He thinks this improvement entirely feasible, and supplemented by free locks at Oregon City would prove a boon to the Willamette valley.

Senator Fulton is right and his efforts should be appreciated and endorsed by the Commercial Club and Merchants' Protective Association of this city. With river steamers and barges plying on the upper Willamette as far as Eugene, there would be no need to further agitate the railroad rate question, or discuss the car shortage problem. The present unsatisfactory transportation conditions would be abolished forever.

With the aid of our delegation in congress it will only be a matter of time when congress must recognize our right to substantial recognition and assistance, and we can hasten that time by actively taking up the work.

Let our commercial bodies appoint open river committees to have special charge of this important work, and get busy backing up the efforts of Senator Fulton and his colleagues.

EUGENE REAL ESTATE GOOD INVESTMENT

Those who are buying Eugene and Lane county realty now are getting in on the ground floor, just as the first persons did who invested in timber lands in Oregon. The latter are reaping their harvest now, and some who were too timid to risk a dollar are inclined to be envious over the good fortune of the more far-seeing investors. Eugene property will be worth many times what it is now when the city doubles in population, as it is almost sure to do within three years. The same will be true of country property with the continuous in-rush of immigrants, which is heavier this year than ever before, and is sure to increase from year to year.

Eugene is certain to become a real city practically as fast as it can be worked over into one. This work was definitely begun when we began to pave streets and build electric lines, and there will be no cessation in its growth for years to come. The rapid development and settlement of the whole West and its geographical location will be responsible for this result. According to all laws governing commercial development Eugene is destined to be a city, and these laws are as immutable as the natural law of gravity.

SECRETARY WILSON SEES LUMBER FAMINE

Years of waste, careless methods and a short-sighted policy in order to gain immediate profits has brought the United States to the eve of a lumber famine, was the declaration made by Secretary of Agriculture Wilson while in San Francisco from the northwest. Although the federal government is doing all in its power to ward off the peril, having set aside 150,000,000 acres of forest reserve lands, the prospective famine, according to Secretary Wilson, can be prevented only by the individual holders or by state laws.

"The waste has been incalculable," said Secretary Wilson, "and the increased cost of lumber at present heralds an impending famine. The loss by forest fires alone amounts to hundreds of thousands of dollars every year."

In reply to a question as to the probability of the federal government taking some action for perpetuating the forests by replanting, Secretary Wilson said:

time, but the checking of the present peril rests with the state and through state laws. The greater part of the Eastern and Middle West country now looks to the Pacific coast for its lumber, and if the coast states wish to maintain this profitable industry in the future they will have to pass and enforce suitable laws governing it."

The Oregon library commission has published a pamphlet which gives a list of good books suitable for children. This list is not intended to include all good books for children, but as an aid to local book-sellers and others in selecting books for children which are good and which are free from objectionable features. Miss Cornelia Marvin, secretary of the commission, has found that there are many persons who are thankful for advice in this line. This last will be found helpful to a great number who do not have opportunity to keep themselves posted on the merits of the great number of books published for children. Knowledge does not take away sympathy and the feeling of brotherhood, but it helps to prevent the sacrifice of those who are the victims of PLANS BASED UPON IGNORANCE.

I have had a dream. I dreamed of the time when by continued scientific investigation man will more clearly recognize the truth, whatever it may be, when he will more clearly see the relation of things, when he will have learned how to conduct himself under a given set of conditions so that the happiness of his fellow men may be increased by his action, when HE WILL INSTINCTIVELY OBEY SANITARY AND MORAL LAWS, when he will recognize the essential truths underlying religions and will be guided by them.
