**COYOTES ARE
INCREASING IN
LANE COUNTY**

**SPENCER CREEK SHEEP OWNERS
LOSE MANY IN THEIR FLICKS
—COYOTES INCREASING IN NUM-
BERS EVERYWHERE—BOUNTY
ON SCALPS WILL NOT EXTER-
MINATE**

Lane county needs a bounty or
something else on coyotes that will
exterminate the wily animals. From
reports from the Spencer Creek dis-
trict coyotes are increasing very rapidly,
and the sheep owners of that
district lose sheep very often.

The sheep have to be corralled
each night, for even if they are as
near as 100 yards from the house
coyotes will attack their woolly vic-
tims. Sometimes they do so in the
daytime. A loss of five or six sheep
in a night is not unusual, when the
sheep are left exposed.

While most of the owners in that
district have not more than forty or
fifty head each, the loss of a few
sheep is, of course, felt all the more.
Goats fare but little better, but
are more easily handled, since they
will come up to a shed themselves
and do not need to be herded. That
a ram will stand off two or three
coyotes is mere nonsense, for there
have been numerous instances where
full grown rams have fallen before
the attacks of coyotes. Coyotes, it
seems, pursue goats as vigorously as
sheep, having the same liking for
goat flesh as for mutton.

Whether a bounty for scalps would
help the situation or not is difficult
to say. It has been tried in Doug-
las county, and while it helps some
coyotes are on the increase there-
too. In fact, every part of the coun-
try where the wily animals roam at
all claims that they are increasing in
numbers.

The only way sheep owners seen
able to combat his depredations is
with dogs, and it is not done there
by killing them, but rather by fright-
ening them out of the vicinity. The
coyote is an animal that lives by its
wits, and the harder the life the more
clever the brain.

Wolves in the Cascades are also
growing in numbers, but while they
are larger and more powerful, they
are not nearly so clever. They pre-
fer to run in packs part of the time,
which necessitates their not being
too near to civilization.

What occasions the increase in
both species is something that ani-
mal students have not solved. Be-
fore the sheep were brought to West-
ern Oregon there were no coyotes in
the country, but with the importing
of the woolly flocks the coyote fol-
lowed from Eastern Oregon.

PORTLAND MARKET REPORT

Portland, Or., Aug. 15.—Front
street is beginning to feel the ef-
fects of the telegraphers' strike,
though the disturbance to business
is confined largely to the large job-
bing concerns and brokers who de-
pend to a considerable extent upon
wire communication with other cit-
ies on the coast and inland. Already
the delays incident to the transmis-
sion of dispatches is felt keenly in
some quarters, and if the strike con-
tinues and the tie-up is made com-
plete, business is sure to be gener-
ally disrupted.

Greater Strength in Butter.
There is scarcely a doubt at this
time in the minds of the general
creamery trade that there will be a
general advance of 2 1/2 cents a pound
in city grades here during the next
few days, to follow the advance of
that amount made by the Hazelwood
company yesterday. While the Haz-
elwood company today stands alone
in charging the higher figures other
creamery men admit that supplies of
cream are showing a decrease from
all sources and they will likely have
to advance their values within a very
short period to the figures named by
the Hazelwood company yesterday.
Along Front street the market is
firmer than ever, and supplies are
very scant, even at the advanced fig-
ure.

Chickens are coming in in only
fair supply, and the market is hold-
ing well at former values.
Dressed meats of all kinds, includ-
ing beef, is in firmer request with
top values well maintained.
Egg Surplus is Disappearing.
The heavy accumulation of eggs

on Front street is gradually being
worked off, and with this an im-
proved condition is noted in the market.
Receipts show a disposition to fall
off, and this helps to relieve the sit-
uation. The market today is slight-
ly firmer than for some time past,
but prices as yet are unchanged.
There is also a fair demand for poultry
and offerings are not large.

Market Long on Cantaloupes.
Cantaloupes of all sorts and con-
ditions, practically all of them Ore-
gon grown, are plentiful, and the
fruit peddlers are getting their share
of the off-grade stocks. Good cants
are worth from \$1.75 to \$2 a crate,
and a few sales of extra fancy stock
were reported today at \$2.25. The
market is also well supplied with wa-
termelons, and they move fairly well
at current prices.

Great Strength in Salmon.
While there is a slightly improved
run of fish reported of late in the
Columbia river, the catch today has
been most disappointing to packers
and buyers. Packers have sold sev-
eral times over what fish they expect
to pack the remainder of the sea-
son. Those who bought have ad-
vanced the price steadily during
the past few weeks, and the indica-
tions at this time are that still fur-
ther advances will be the outcome be-
fore the next spring run is under-
way. A prominent brokerage firm
estimates the Columbia run at 300,
000 cases, against 360,000 cases a
year ago.

The firm writes:
"News from Southeastern Alaska
has been coming in and the outlook
is even worse than we expected. It
is now predicted that the pack in
that section will be at least 100,000
cases short. This, together with the
shortage in the Behring sea and the
shortage at some of the canneries in
central Alaska, will practically be
equivalent to 400,000 cases less Alas-
ka salmon than in 1906. For com-
parison we give you herewith figures
showing the pack of 1906 and the es-
timated pack of 1907:

"There is no carry-over, the mar-
ket on the Pacific coast being bare
and the lightest stocks in jobbers'
hands ever known at this time of
year. Remember also that the es-
timated pack of Alaska, Chituma and Co-
lumbia river chinooks has been vir-
tually exhausted. As a result, the
market is now in a state of ex-
haustion, and the pack of sockeyes
will be so small as to cut
very little figure in the situation. The
salmon that should, therefore, com-
mand the immediate attention of the
trade is Alaska red."

Brief Notes of the Trade.
Supplies of tomatoes are increas-
ing, but prices are holding rather
well.

First Oregon grapes of the season
reported in this morning from The
Dallies by Dyer, Bolland & Co. and
McEwen & Koskey. Price rules at
\$1.25 per box.

Peach supplies are much increased,
but market is holding well, especial-
ly for the better grades.

Potato market is in fine shape, with
supplies small. No outside shipments
as yet.

According to George S. Beal, of the
Pillar Rock cannery, the run of sal-
mon is about better and a further
improvement is expected this week.
Some very choice Rocky Ford
"cants" from The Dallies were shown
on the street today, and brought the
highest figures on the market. Much
mixed quality in the general run.

Oregon growers of Bartlett pears
believe they are being unjustly dealt
with by the cannerymen of the state.
They say the prices that have been
offered this year in Oregon are far
below those offered by the cannery-
men of California for fruit grown in that
state.

**LANE HATCHERIES
ARE READY FOR SEASON**

The two new fish hatcheries in
Lane county, the one on the McKen-
zie and the Sluslaw station, are al-
most ready for the fall run of fish,
from which they will take their sea-
son's eggs for the hatch of salmon
spawn.

The work at the Sluslaw station
was done by Superintendent Joseph
Simmons. The building is a one-
story structure, 106x40 feet, with a
ten-foot ceiling. It has a capacity
for 100 hatching troughs, each 17
feet 10 inches long.

The new hatchery building for the
McKenzie was completed and accept-
ed by Superintendent W. A. Smith
June 29, 1907. Its dimensions are
109 by 55 feet. The capacity of the
building is 168 hatching troughs 15
feet long. The result of the work of
the hatchery will not be felt for three
or four years to any great extent,
but then the work will show for it-
self, unless it is negligently done.
The object of the hatchery employes
should not be to produce a certain
number of hundred thousands of
spawn, but rather to put forth spawn
that can take care of themselves, and
be able to avoid their enemies.
