## OUTLOOK OF

### HOP CROP AT HOME AND ABROAD

Waterville Times, August 9: The local market has continued very quiet the past week, dealers showing no inclination to buy at the prices asked. With concessions in prices it is understood some business could be transacted. The coast markets are also very quiet, business being of small volume at last reported prices. Growers are still holding their remaining stock firmly, but if the inactivity continues there is no doubt they will be willing to sell at the best price obtainable before long. Crop news is practically unchanged. A heavy wind storm in New York state did some damage to the vine, but not to any serious extent. Otherwise there is no change reported, the vines being absolutely free from mold. The coast crop continues growing steadily with good weather. There are some reports of lice from Oregon, but reliable parties claim this is greatly overestimated. Cables from England report the crop making good progress, and the outlook fair for an average yield. Germany reports cold weather, but hops making good progress, and a good crop expected. The London and Continental markets are reported somewhat easier for 1906 hops.

### FRUIT IN VERY GOOD

#### CONDITION IN EUGENE

J. Beebe, county fruit inspector, has gone through the stores in Eugene this week and investigated the fruit that was on sale. While some was condemned and destroyed, there were no flagrant violations of the law. The merchants seem to be well pleased with the work of the inspector, not because little grounds for complaint were found, but because of the fact that they are not obliged to handle fruit that is diseased. While to condemn the fruit in the stores works a little hardship on the fruit dealer, it is a very effective way of making the grower feel the uselessness of having trees that are diseased, for when the market is cut off the product is of little use to him. It is only here and there that anyone makes any serious complaint against the work of the inspector, and when in a year or two he feels the benefit of the enforcement of the law, that person is only too glad that it exists.

## HERBERT LEIGH HAS OPTIONS ON BOHEMIA MINES

It is understood that Herbert Leigh, of Eugene, has succeeded in securing options on several mines on Grouse Mountain in the Bohemia district, including the Noonday and Knogot property, says the Western Oregon. He has clients who are considering the advisability of going to work this fall to make those properties producers. At the Noonday there is a 20-stamp mill driven by a steam engine of 120 horsepower. True, this machinery has not been operated for several years, but it has been taken care of and can be put in the commission soon. The roof of the mill was crushed in last winter by the great weight of snow that fell upon it.

Miners interested in these properties, together with others in the vicinity of Ridge Hotel, are repairing the viaduct known as the Noonday road. It will be ready for wagon travel in a few days. The Noonday is considered one of the best properties in the camp, and has been a rich producer, but years ago the owners got into litigation and tied the mine up with the red tape of the courts. It took seven years to untangle the title, but it is understood that all litigation has been terminated, and there is nothing to hinder enterprising miners from going ahead and mining the great body of rich ore that is already blocked out. It is claimed that there is enough ore in sight to pay all repair expenses and leave a handsome surplus for dividends. The top of the ledge is free milling, but the deep levels encounter rich base ores.

## LORANE CHEESE FACTORY TEMPORARILY CLOSES

Because of the rush of harvest and the shrinkage of the milk supply, due to the advance of summer, the cheese factory at Lorane has been closed, but at an informal meeting of the patrons with the factory people it was decided to open the plant next spring. The patrons on their part agreeing to furnish milk in greater quantities than heretofore, says the Cottage Grove Western Oregon. The industry is past the experimental stage and is now a producer. In the study of the conditions it has developed that if every farmer now within reach of the factory would keep 20 cows and let half of his plow land go to pasture or even lay idle, his income would be doubled. Half the land he now cultivates is ample for the maintenance of 20 cows. The total income going to the farmers within reach of the factory is worked on the lines indicated would amount to \$37,000. Farmed to grain it does not earn half that income. Another year will see many changes in the farm methods of the Lorane country.
