\$2000 FOR RACES DURING ROSEBURG FAIR

Over \$2000 will be given in purses alone during the district fair which will be held at Roseburg September 10-14. The purses will be divided between trotting, pacing and running races chiefly, with a few lesser sums on the popular village races known as saddle and pony races.

The premiums on products sent to the pavilions will also be liberal, though just the amount to be appropriated for that purpose has not been announced.

The speed program follows:
Wednesday, September 11—Pacing, 2:35 class, purse \$200; running, 1-2 mile dash (for three-year-olds and under, owned in the district), purse \$125; running, 7-8 mile dash, purse \$150; running, 1-4 mile dash (for ponies under 800 lbs.), purse \$25.

Tuesday September 12—Trotting and pacing, 2:25 class, purse \$200; trotting (for three-year-olds and under, owned in the district), purse \$100; running, 1-2 mile heats, best two in three, purse, \$125; running, 1-2 mile dash, for saddle horses only, purse \$50.

Friday, September 13—Merchants' stake, trotting and pacing, free for all, purse, \$250; matrons' stake, trotting and pacing, open to all breed mares that have never dropped a foal, purse \$150; running, 1 mile dash, purse \$100; running, 5-8 mile dash, (for ponies under 800 lbs.), purse \$25.

Saturday, September 14—Trotting, 2:30 class, purse \$200; Douglas county Derby, 1 1-8 mile handicap, purse \$200; running, 1-2 mile, consolation for non-winners, purse \$100; running, 1-2 mile, open to saddle horses only, purse \$50.

A great deal of inconvenience is being felt by people building in Eugene this summer because of their inability to get carpenters to erect their homes. Perhaps there are fifty carpenters in town today, but there is undoubtedly work for 100.

Last winter there was not work enough all the time for all the carpenters that were here, but that day seems to have passed for good, and from now on it will be a question of supplying the demand.

From the rate buildings are going up and being planned now, Eugene seems to be starting in what may be called a boom, though every indication points to the fact that there will not be the customary reaction, which is usually associated with the word boom.

But even then it seems that there will not be enough suitable and desirable houses this fall for the newcomers, for with the opening of the university new families always come to the city. Where they will reside this year is a problem from present appearances.

PROPOSITION MADE TO BUILD ELECTRIC ROAD

will be an independent competing line.

No definite action was taken by the committee last night owing to the fact that several members are very busy with their private interests and others are out of town, but it was decided that the proposition would be considered without any unnecessary delay, and the consensus of opinion was that its conditions could be complied with. The fact that the Carver proposition is held up until spring anyway, requiring no payment of stock subscriptions for some time, in the future at best, it was thought that most of the subscribers to this list would be willing to take up the other and more definite proposition first. This feeling was the more pronounced since there is reason to believe that the Portland-Eugene electric road, when constructed, will push out feeders through the country tapped by the proposed Carver road, and that one of these will extend down the Stuslaw to Florence.

That this proposition will be taken up at once and settled is sure, since the members of the soliciting committee believe that work would now have been in progress on the Carver road to the Stuslaw, had the people responded more promptly to the call for subscriptions. For that reason they propose to push the electric road proposition, and have it settled one way or the other without any unnecessary delay.

**OVER 284 RAILS LAID
ON STREET RAILWAY**

The street railway company has

laid so far, from the Southern Pacific depot grounds to the corner of Oak and Eleventh streets, 284 rails. As the number of ties under each rail will average eighteen, 2356 ties have so far been laid in approximately eight blocks of track.

Foreman Utterback is working just half of his crew at track-laying, the rest laying vitrified brick along Willamette street. Work there is also progressing rapidly, the men becoming more accustomed to the work.

On Eleventh street the men digging out the trench for the track have struck the old surface of the first roadway, and find it almost as hard as pavement. If the grade were only two inches higher they could rest their ties upon this surface, and make the foundation all the stronger.

FIFTY-FOUR PEDAGOGUES PASS EXAM

The teachers' examinations for county papers was finished yesterday afternoon, and the examination ended their labors last night. Owing to the fact that the county needs teachers so badly, after the first day's experience, when some of the examination papers were found to rank so low, the examiners were compelled to be lenient, and as a result only seven of the sixty-one failed.

Of the rest twenty-six will receive first-grade certificates, an unprecedented number; fifteen second grade, and twelve third grade. One of those who failed was taken sick and did not complete the examination.

This afternoon the applicants for state papers are finishing up their examinations, which will be corrected by the state board.

In the entire number there was just one applicant for a primary certificate. These are papers granted to teachers who wish to teach in the first grade only.

UNIVERSITY LIBRARY IS ACCEPTED

The building committee of the board of regents of the University of Oregon met yesterday afternoon and after examining the new library building accepted it as fulfilling the contract. The building is not completely finished, for there is considerable yet to be done in making the rooms ready for occupancy. Shelves, chairs, lights, tables and other similar things are yet to be provided.

The library proper will be on the second floor, which is a splendid apartment for the twenty thousand volumes which make up the university collection. The third floor will be used for class rooms, while the first floor, or basement, will have four rooms for instructors. The library may be known as Johnson Hall.

The girls' clubhouse was accepted some time ago. It is also yet to be furnished, and when ready will make a home for about twenty girls.
