### COACH FROST

#### WILL ARRIVE ON SEPTEMBER 24

OREGON'S NEW COACH TAKING GREAT INTEREST—MANAGER KESTLEY'S SCHEDULE—O. A. C. GAME AT EUGENE—OREGON WILL HAVE SPLENDID ELEVEN

Gordon B. Frost, coach for the University of Oregon football team, will arrive here not later than September 24. Frost is taking great interest in his coaching this year, and while spending the summer at his home at Fort Ann, New York, will see Walter Camp, of Yale, Coach Reid, of Harvard, and get the exact interpretation of the rules and other information of plays available.

Manager Kestley recently received a letter from him, and his impression of the man is that Oregon will have a splendid coach this autumn. Frost is not a football player alone, but is a brainy man in other fields, and has made a success of the game at other institutions. He will undoubtedly put out a good team here.

All but five of the old men will be back, four of them, King, McKinney, Chandler and Latourrette, being graduates and the fifth, Moulton, who it is understood will not return. There will be plenty of good material judging from present indications.

The schedule comprises a most interesting lot of games, most of which will be played away from home. The schedule follows:

Oregon vs. Pacific University at Eugene, October 19.

Oregon vs. Willamette University at Salem, November 2.

Oregon vs. University of Idaho at Portland, October 25.

Oregon vs. O. A. C. at Eugene, November 9.

Oregon vs. University of Washington at Seattle, November 16.

Oregon vs. Multnomah at Portland, November 26.

Only one really important game will be played at Eugene, the one with the university's old rival, the agricultural college. The game with Pacific University is played for the reason that Forest Grove will be stronger this year, and the Oregon management desired a practice game with a college team rather than with some club at the first of the season.

The game at Portland with the University of Idaho is simply an experiment, being tried for the reason that the expense of bringing a team from Moscow is so great. Whether the people of Portland will support the game well enough in that city to make such a game a precedent for following years in a question that cannot be decided until this year's game has been played.

O. A. C. is making a great deal of noise about their team this year, and claim to believe that they will beat the Oregon team, but that is their usual custom. This year they play on Kincaid Field, and not on a plowed gridiron. Willamette University usually produces a strong eleven, but what this year's team will be is difficult to guess. If not strong it will afford a good game for a tryout between the game with Idaho and the Oregon farmers.

The University of Washington game, just after the Corvallis game, should be the hardest college game of the year, being played at Seattle. Washington has the promise of a splendid aggregation this year, and Oregon will have to play her very fastest football to defeat the Evergreen team.

There is a bare possibility that the university may meet the Washington State College team, for in case that team should pass undefeated, as she did last year, and the University of Oregon should again win the championship of the Northwest, a game can be arranged for November 23 between the two colleges, on the supposition that the two faculties would grant permission.

On Thanksgiving Day Oregon, as usual, meets Multnomah, and will try again to lower the colors of the club men. Multnomah will probably have its customary aggregation of stars, while Oregon, if she does not play the Eastern Washington team, will have a ten-days' rest.

MILK CONDENSER ON WOOLEN MILL SITE

The Linn Milk Condenser site committee has done a good job by taking their time and going to the bottom of the site proposition for the milk condenser. The committee has secured the water front block of the woolen mill, including the brick walls in good condition, the turbine wheels, electric motors and water pipes, the consideration being \$2800, a bargain. The building will be reconstructed, the walls remaining as now, into a two-story building. There is also a frame warehouse building, 50x90 feet. The condenser will thus have a brick building that will be a credit and a first-class location on the railroad, ready for shipments.

A 25 per cent levy has been made, and the plant will be ordered in time to reach here when the building is ready for it.—Democrat.
