Letters are arriving from all sections of the state asking for exact rates from different points throughout the United States to Oregon. From Kansas City, and other Missouri river points, St. Paul, Duluth and Winnipeg, the rate is \$25; From Oklahoma City and St. Louis, \$30; Chicago, \$33; Buffalo, \$42.50; Cincinnati and Louisville, \$38; Des Moines, \$29; Indianapolis, \$33.85; Boston, \$49.90; New York, \$50; Pittsburgh, \$42; Memphis, \$37.50; Birmingham, Alabama, \$44.50. Each ticket is \$2.50 less when bought to points east of Umatilla. The rates given above cover almost the entire country, and are the same proportionately from all smaller stations.
