IN PREMIUMS AT ROSEBURG FAIR

The premiums offered at the Fourteenth Annual Exhibition of the Second Southern Oregon District Fair, to be held at Roseburg, Sept. 10-14, are very valuable, approximating a sum of over \$6,000. The prizes are offered on various kinds of product, being especially adapted to agricultural products. The number of premiums offered is 1228, including in most of them first, second and third prizes.

The value of each premium ranges on each number from \$21 to \$1. The most valuable ones are offered on livestock of all kinds. Poultry also has paying offers.

All kinds of farm products, including garden dairy, and every other department of work, has its prizes, as well as domestic work, including cooking, sewing and fancy work. The fine arts also receive some attention, as does photography.

Premiums are offered on ores and what the mines produce.

The object of the directors of the enterprise is not to allow the racing program and its interest and purses to overshadow the exhibition of what people produce themselves. They, therefore, try to offer three times as much for premiums as for purses, the latter aggregating a little more than \$2,000.

V. P. Hollenbeck of this city is second vice-president of the society and he and C. M. Young, also of Eugene, are on the board of commissioners.

MESSAGES OVER WESTERN

UNION THIS MORNING

A few messages got through the Western Union office this morning and it is likely that they will come through slowly at other periods until the strike is ended one way or another. From Portland they have had infrequent intervals of communication with San Francisco, but this is the second time that communication has been opened from Eugene.

Detectives are trying to catch the railroad operator that holds the keys open, but it seems a hard and almost impossible task. The operators so far as known have no system, but when one throws the line into service some one else, perhaps scores of miles away, breaks in. While the officers of the railway company have tried to locate the operators who are deadening the line they have so far not succeeded very well except in one case, that of an operator at West Fork in Cow Creek canyon, in Douglas county.

The Postal telegraph office in Portland has got another operator on their force there.
