COTTAGE GROVE FORMS POULTRY ASSOCIATION

FIRST EXHIBITION WILL BE
HELD NEXT SEPTEMBER—LIBERAL PRIZES WILL BE OFFERED—LOCAL AND PERSONAL NOTES OF THE GROVE.

Last Thursday evening the representative poultry fanciers of this vicinity met at the office of F. H. Rosenberg and organized a poultry association, the object of the organization being the promotion, building and fostering of the poultry industry of southern Lane and northern Douglas counties, and the holding of poultry shows and dissemination of information relative to poultry keeping both for profit and pleasure.

The meeting was called to order by F. H. Rosenberg, who after stating the object of the meeting, announced that nominations were in order for officers of the new association, whereupon the following named persons were made the unanimous choice of those present: Vice-president, F. H. Rosenberg; secretary, Charles Walker, Thomas Aubrey and Rufus Arne. A committee on ways and means was appointed as follows: D. B. Chamberlain, D. T. Aubrey and H. K. Metcalf. It was voted to hold the first annual poultry show of the association at this place December 12, 13 and 14, 1907. The Eugene association has promised to co-operate with the local association to make the show the desired success.

Local Mention.
G. F. Garoutte and Charles Teaters with their families have just returned from a camping trip of two weeks, taken on the Middle Fork. They miles. In that ramble they got neither venison or fish, except two geese that were given them by more successful mountain men. The weather was fine and the mountain air and scenery put new spirits in place of that tired feeling. On their return they passed near the Veatch camp at Crowbar Point, where they spread their blankets, having broken their wagon. The wagon master had to come back a distance of thirty miles to the last blacksmith shop on the road for the necessary repairs.

The Coyote Club, of Cottage Grove, a local association of farmers and stockmen, has been organized and paying bounties for coyote scalps since last December. During the eight and a half months of its active work seven coyotes have been killed. The bounty paid is \$10 for each animal killed, and \$5 for the outsider who does the killing. The membership of the organization is now about 65. The general fund of the club is replenished by levying an assessment on the membership whenever a scalp is brought in for cancellation.

The Dorena district is adding another room to the schoolhouse this summer and will at the beginning of the year enlarge the curriculum by adding a two years' high school course. Miss Elsie Lea, of Cottage Grove, is being principal, having in her charge two classes in the high school and three in the eighth grade school.

The Brown Lumber Company has lately been operating the planer overtime on local orders. Twelve hours per day is the rule, and these would probably be lengthened if the electric current were available for light.

Tom Meaden is in town from his mining property in Bohemia on the old Noonday route into the hills. Tom is showing some handsome quartz, not unlike that which made the Knott property famous, and says that he has lots of it.

It is told that Mrs. John Curdin, living on the old Row river homestead, is not very well this summer. She is nearing the 90-year milestone, and every little indisposition is alarming. Pioneer John, however, is quite rugged and is carrying his 90 years easily.

Harry Parker is down from the Parker Brothers' property on Noonday ridge. The Noonday boys all report handsome showings so far this season.—Western Oregon.

FIRE PENALTIES ARE STRICTER THAN EVER

The last legislature made the laws protecting the forests of the state from fire more strict than ever before. The penalties in some cases have been increased, and more care must be taken now.

Notices posted state that any person willfully or negligently allowing a fire to escape from his own lands shall be punished by a fine of not less than \$50 nor more than \$1000, or be sentenced to prison for a period of not less than one month or more than one year.

Any person leaving a camp fire burning or who permits it to spread is liable to a fine of not less than \$25 or more than \$500.

Any person in hunting that uses firearms, guns, revolvers, or pistols, with other than incandescent wadding is liable to a fine of not less than \$25 or more than \$500.

Setting out fires is the worst crime in the calendar of fire penalties, for any one doing so shall be imprisoned for a term of not less than one year or more than ten in the penitentiary.

Those who break the latter law are usually mountaineers, who have lived in their vicinity so long that they feel that they have a right to do whatever they please with the surrounding forests and mountains.

SPRINGFIELD WILL HAVE BANK ANYHOW

John B. Bell and Benjamin Ayers, of Astoria, Wash., are preparing to erect a brick building in Springfield 20x100 feet on the land owned by the Springfield-Banking Company, the backers of which now plan to put in a bank here in Eugene, and start a banking business just as soon as they can get their building up and fitted with a vault and furnishings.

What the capitalization will be, or what kind of a corporation will be organized has not been determined, and will depend upon future developments.

Springfield needs a bank, and the first people to start one there will doubtless make a success of the enterprise.
