JEFFRIES AND PARTY TO ARRIVE SEPTEMBER 1

WILL BE TWENTY-ONE PEOPLE
TO GO INTO CAMP AT TWILLIGER HOT SPRINGS—SEVEN WOMEN—MAYOR OF LOS ANGELES AND OTHER DIGNITARIES.

James J. Jeffries, champion prize fighter of the world, and party, including fourteen of his friends from California and New York, State Game Warden J. W. Baker, of Cottage Grove, Alf Walker, of this city, and Henry Stewart, of Springfield, and the guides of last year, Bird and Arthur Belknap, of Belknap Springs, will start for their camp at Twilliger Hot Springs, ten miles from Belknap Springs, up the South Fork of the McKenzie river, one week from tomorrow morning. Monday morning the outfit for the party will start for the camp in charge of Frank Stewart. The food composes a great quantity of everything, and the party will live like kings while on the trip in every respect.

Alf Walker has received a letter from Jeffries giving the names of his party and other information concerning the trip. The party is composed of such prominent people as Mayor Harper, of Los Angeles; D. Lanterman, coroner of Los Angeles, and wife; H. A. Woodill and wife, Police Commissioner P. B. Roy and wife; Burt Flint and wife, E. W. Hopland and wife, sister and son, Police Commissioner Lewis, all of Los Angeles or vicinity so far as known, and Joe Miles, of New York.

State Game Warden J. W. Baker will join the party here with Alf Walker and Henry Stewart. Besides these Bird and Arthur Belknap will go along to show the hunting grounds and act as guides and do the packing, and there will also be a cook, making a total of twenty-one in the party, of which seven will be women.

The camp will be the same one that Jeffries went to last year, and the guides, Bird and Arthur Belknap, gave such satisfaction last year that they have been engaged again to do all the packing from Belknap Springs.

The party will be in the woods for about fifteen days. They will arrive in Eugene on Sunday morning, September 1, and will immediately leave for the Springs. On Monday morning, September 2, they will arrive at their camp, which Jeffries thinks is an Eden of hunting and fishing grounds.

Alf Walker is making arrangements for the party and trip, and as he so successfully carried the trip through last year, he will undoubtedly maintain his reputation and that of the county for having the best things in the world in the way of a sportsman's paradise.

HARRIMAN HUNTING BEARS IN KLAMATH

Klamath Falls, Aug. 22—The Harriman party is today enjoying its first bear hunt up in the mountains back of Pelican Bay Lodge. It is said that the guides employed have located several large ones, and to make sure that they do not escape a pack of trained bear dogs, with a guarantee that they will put the bear up a tree even though his tracks be forty-eight hours old, reached the lodge early this morning. When Mr. Harriman had left New York arrangements had been made for the pack of dogs to follow him, but the matter fell through, and it was necessary to procure the dogs on the coast. The dogs are from a pack owned in Portland, and were brought here direct from Dr. H.

FOREST FIRE MAY HAVE BEEN ON LAKE CREEK

From reports and the smoke here there was either a forest fire or a large slashing fire yesterday in the Lake Creek country. Last evening the smoke was almost a smudge shortly after 6 o'clock, and some men situated where they could see the Lake Creek mountains stated that the smoke in the afternoon was rolling up in good-sized clouds. They could not tell exactly what kind of a fire it was, but seemed to think it was a forest fire. At any rate the rain has cleared the atmosphere and doubtless drowned out the fire.

Very few fires have started at all in Lane county or the entire state this summer, for the reason of the care of the fire wardens, and that the woods have not become exceedingly dry.
