PORTLAND COMMERCIAL CLUB
PREPARING TO DISTRIBUTE
VAST QUANTITY OF LITERATURE—FOUR HUNDRED THOUSAND LEAFLETS ARE TO BE DISTRIBUTED, BEGINNING THE FIRST OF SEPTEMBER

Guard Special Service.
Portland, Or., Aug. 24.—The Portland Commercial Club will conduct a whirlwind advertising campaign with the colonist rate to Oregon the special feature, beginning the campaign August 28th.

Four hundred thousand leaflets, giving in condensed form the facts about the state and city will be put in the hands of the business houses, banks, real estate firms, and others, and these leaflets will be enclosed in letters going through the postoffice, whether addressed locally or otherwise.

So that they may reach the homes, the large stores will wrap a leaflet in every bundle, and in this way they will be distributed throughout the city and over the state so that those who receive them can put them in their personal letters.

At least fifty of the larger houses of the city will be supplied with these leaflets so that they may be sent out with their monthly statements September 1st, giving them immediately an enormous circulation as regards Portland and Oregon, and this is the plan of advertising that can be used advantageously by every city and town in Oregon. Many of them have already adopted the plan through the suggestion of the Oregon Development League.

These leaflets are so light in weight as to add nothing to the cost of postage, and they give, among other things, the rates from the following cities, which pretty well cover the United States and Canada, to Eugene and other points in Oregon.

Mr. Stark has conducted hotels in various parts of the state for over sixteen years, and is a practical man at the business. The lease does not include the furnishings, which belong to Mr. Renshaw, who will dispose of them if possible, and if not store them until he is certain that the big Sanford hotel building will materialize. In case that plan is carried out successfully, Mr. Renshaw expects to have his hotel started in six or seven months.

His idea is to run a place on a much higher standard than any in the city at present. He wants to cater to the high-class tourist trade, which cares not for expense, and believes that such a hotel in Eugene will make money, for the reason that hundreds of wealthy people are now passing through the country who would prefer to stay at the highest-priced house possible, and that these people would be attracted to Eugene if such a place were provided. His establishment will be run on the European plan.

He also had an option on the Smeede building and could have leased again for five years.

Stephen Smeede announces that at the end of Renshaw's contract for the Smeede he will add another story to the hotel building and make it probably the first four-story building in Eugene. That will necessitate an elevator, and the structure is likely to be improved in other ways.

MENAGERIE IN RINGLING'S IS VERY INTERESTING

To the student of natural history there is more to be learned by an afternoon spent in the menagerie of Ringling Brothers' circus than there is in a year's research through libraries and park zoos. The zoological collection is complete and in it are half a dozen animals to be seen nowhere else in the country. As a matter of fact the three giraffes and the rhinoceros owned by this circus are the only ones in captivity anywhere. The pair of hippopotami are also the only ones in America.

In addition to these animals other objects of interest in the animal display are more than half the animals in America, a score of camels and dromedaries, horned horses, bears, tigers, lions, and a variety of other animals, including a black leopard, a Philippine eagle, a sacred ox, kangaroos, beehives, chimpanzees, foxes, many kinds of deer and specimens of the cat family, black and white llamas and yaks, hyenas, nyctagals, zebras, water buffaloes and zebras.
