The city attorney was instructed to prepare a notice of advertisement for bids for the paving of the district on Seventh, Eighth and Ninth streets, for which ordinance has already been passed.

The council then adjourned into a committee of the whole to discuss the municipal water system.

THOMAS O'DAY GETS SEARS' VACANT CHAIR

Governor Chamberlain has appointed Hon. Thomas O'Day to the vacancy on the circuit bench of Multnomah county, caused by the death of Judge A. F. Sears in Portland yesterday. In announcing the appointment the governor said that the proprieties of the case might have made delay advisable, but as a session of the circuit court commences next Monday he wished to give the appointee a certain amount of notice, so he would be enabled to arrange his business preparatory to taking his place on the bench at the opening of this session.
