JACK KING SHOWS BASE INGRATITUDE

Mphtnomah Trainer, Who Accuses
Kelly of Professionalism, Made
Famous by University of Oregon
Writers.

Jack King's accusations of professionalism against Dan Kelly is a case of the greatest ingratitude toward the representatives of the University of Oregon, for the reason that C. N. ("Pat") McArthur is the man to whom King must look for his recent reputation, which has caused the Portland newspapers to listen to his talk. Last spring McArthur, in the Oregonian, wrote a series of articles concerning track work, in which King was constantly boosted as a great track trainer. The other Portland papers took King up, and once more he was boosted to a pinnacle of fame.

Now that he accuses Kelly of being a professional, implicating the University of Oregon, he has gone back on the men of the institution who have done more for him and his name than anything else. To a large degree the honors of the track which Multnomah has captured is due to the University of Oregon track men and their trainer, Hayward, and their records and victories made it possible for writers connected with the college here to make King a man of consequence in the sporting world.

RECEIVER OF DRAIN BANK SWORN IN

Roseburg, Aug. 27.—George M. Bassett, who was appointed receiver of the Bank of Drain by Circuit Judge L. T. Harris, was today sworn in by County Clerk Agee and at once entered upon his duties. The majority of the stock in this bank is held by the Oregon Trust & Savings Bank, of Portland. The closing of the Portland bank caused a run on the Drain bank, and the subsequent closing of that institution. The Drain bank is solvent and all depositors will receive dollar for dollar for their claims.

The appointment of the former cashier as receiver shows that the bank has been run with perfect satisfaction to all concerned, and that the closing was due solely to the closing of the Portland bank.

The Bank of Drain was incorporated with \$20,000 capital stock, \$14,000 of which was owned by the Oregon Trust & Savings Bank. The remainder was held by residents of Drain, and it is the intention of the Drain stockholders, as soon as the matter can be arranged with Reesley or Devlin of the Oregon Trust & Savings Bank of Portland, to purchase the stock held by that bank and reopen the Drain bank solely with local capital.

PREPARING TO REBUILD HALF BLOCK OF WALK

Measurements for the cement walk which will have to be rebuilt along the half block on Willamette street extending from the alley at Kays' furniture store to the Chambers-Bristow bank were taken today and the work will begin within a few days. The walk will have to be raised several inches to conform to the grade of the street, and there will be a slope of about an inch and a half from the curb to the building line.
