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TELEPHONE LINES AND TRAILS FOR FOREST RESERVE

HUNDRED NINETY MILES OF

LINE TO BE CONSTRUCTED AT ONCE IN CASCADE RESERVE--

TRAIL TO BE BUILT FROM MCKENZIE BRIDGE TO CALIFORNIA LINE

S. C. Bartrum, supervisor of forest reserves, with headquarters at Roseburg, returned to that city this afternoon after having spent a couple of days here in the interests of the service. He was here for the purpose of looking after the beginning of work on a system of telephone lines which the government will at once construct in the Cascade reserve and to be owned by the forest service.

Mr. Bartrum told a Guard reporter the plans for the new telephone lines today. One line will extend from Lowell, twenty miles east of Eugene, on the Willamette river, over the mountains to Odell, a distance of about 120 miles, to connect with the Deschutes company's line from Prineville and Shaniko. The work of constructing this line will begin on September 9. The crew of men will be sent out from Eugene and will continue at the work until the line is completed. A large shipment of the wire, insulators and brackets has already been received here and more is expected at any time.

In addition to the line from Lowell to Odell, the service will at once begin work on a line from Eagle Point, twelve miles northeast of Medford, to Grater Lake, a distance of 70 miles. This will be built in connection with a line projected by the Cater Lake Company.

While these lines are built expressly for the convenience of those connected with the forest service and to facilitate the work of the supervisors and rangers, they may be used to a certain extent by the public and will be a great convenience in a commercial way. Eugene will have direct communication with Prineville and other Eastern Oregon points when the Lowell-Odell line is completed.

Also Building Trails. Mr. Bartrum also informed the reporter that the work of building a good trail through the Cascade reserve from McKenzie Bridge south to the California line has been begun. Two gangs of twenty-five men each have been at work for several days, one in Jackson county and the other in Douglas county, and a third will be put on in Lane county next Monday, starting from McKenzie Bridge. Seventy-five men in all will be engaged in this work.

Two gangs of men will also start out in a few days to build houses in various parts of the reserve for the rangers. The houses will be commodious, substantially built and at each one there will be an enclosure for horse pasture of from 20 to 320 acres in extent each. There will be twelve or fifteen of these houses in the reserve.

This work is all in addition to the regular work of the supervisor and comes under the head of permanent improvements. It is for the betterment of the service, and to place it on as high a standard as possible.

galow to be built at once on the vacant lot just south of the old Comberland Presbyterian church building on Pearl street.
