A. S. CURRIE EXPIRES AFTER WEEK'S ILLNESS

CAME TO COAST IN 1849 AT THE TIME OF DISCOVERY OF GOLD—RESIDENT OF EUGENE 25 YEARS, BEING PIONEER HARNNESS MAKER

Algernon Sidney Currie, a coast pioneer of 1849 and an honorable citizen of Eugene for the past 25 years, died at his home at 751 Olive street at 11:55 last night after an illness of only a week's duration. Up till last Saturday he had been in fairly good health. He had arisen early and went outside of the house and in a few moments was found lying on the ground in an unconscious condition. A general breaking down caused by old age was doubtless the cause of death.

Mr. Currie was born near Charleston, West Virginia, August 21, 1825. While he was an infant his parents moved to Willsville, Va., and from there when he was 11 years old they moved to Kentucky. From that state they came west to Iowa, and finally settled in St. Louis, where the subject of this sketch worked at the trades of bricklayer and harnessmaker until the discovery of gold in California, when, in 1849, he came to the coast and became engaged in mining in Shasta and Trinity counties, Cal. He was married to Miss Rebecca McElvenny in Trinity county, October 4, 1860, and to them six children were born, two of whom died in infancy. Those now living are: Margaret J. Currie, Mrs. Mattie Inman, Charles E. Currie and Joseph A. Currie, all of Eugene.

In 1869 Mr. and Mrs. Currie moved back to Lafayette county, Mo., but returned to California in 1874, where Mr. Currie once more became engaged in mining. In 1881 they came to Eugene and have resided here continuously since. In 1883 Mr. Currie became engaged in the harness and saddle-making business here, retiring in 1891, when he sold out to C. H. Hales, who is now in the same business with W. M. Preston. The funeral will be held at the home of Mrs. W. W. Inman at 751 Olive street Sunday afternoon at 2:30 o'clock with interment in the Masonic cemetery. Rev. E. A. McAllister, of the Universalist church, will conduct the services.

DOUBLE WEDDING AT BIG FALL CREEK

The contracting parties were from North Carolina, with the exception of Mr. Wright, who is from Kentucky. After the marriage a typical Southern dinner was participated in, and was particularly enjoyed by the officiating minister. The bridegrooms are both prosperous men, and indications are that each couple will spend many happy days together.—Springfield News.

GREAT ACTIVITY IN CEMENT WALK BUILDING

BOTH SIDES OF WILLAMETTE STREET FROM THE DEPOT GROUNDS TO ELEVENTH STREET WILL SOON BE LINED WITH TWELVE-FOOT WALKS

There is great activity in cement sidewalk building in Eugene, especially on Willamette street, where the bitulithic pavement is being laid. Within a short time the entire street from the depot grounds to Eleventh street, which is the length of the paving district, will be lined with twelve-foot cement walks on both sides.

S. H. Friendly had the wooden sidewalk in front of his residence at Tenth and Willamette streets torn up this morning and will at once lay a cement walk in its place. He will also extend the cement on the Tenth street side of the property from Willamette street to the alley. The Sisters of Mercy also took up the walk adjoining Mr. Friendly's property and will lay a cement walk from the Friendly line to the alley. The wooden walk on the other half of the block owned by the Catholics will remain for some time.

Cement and other materials are on the ground for the half block of walk in front of the C. S. Frank property between Tenth street and the alley north. The driveway entering the block, as before stated by the Guard, will be constructed of bitulithic pavement. S. M. Titus will extend his cement walk south to the alley adjoining the Frank property. Material for the work is on the ground.

The big locust trees in front of the Methodist church property are being cut down so that the new cement walk, as mentioned by the Guard last evening, can be laid. The Methodists will have half a block of new walk to construct. At the same time Geo. B. Dorris and the Christian church will build on the remaining half block.

E. J. Frasier has informed Chief of Police Farrington that he has let the contract for the construction of a walk in front of his property on North Willamette street, nearly three-fourths of a block. He says he will cut down the maple trees in front of the property.

Work on the 100 feet of walk in front of the theatre block was begun this morning, and F. L. Chambers is cutting down the trees in front of his residence property on the same block preparatory to replacing the wooden walk with cement.

Geo. Midgley is also ready to build his walk in front of his block next to the Hampton Bros. building. In fact, has been waiting on the builders for some time past, as are also N. R. Gaylord, J. W. White and others on the half block between the new post-office site and Fifth street.

The gravel has been placed for the walk between the Chrismam block and the alley on the south and the workmen will get at it as soon as they can.
