

FATAL PISTOL DUEL OCCURS AT MARCOLA THIS AFTERNOON

CHARLES CROWLEY KILLED AND BERT NUNN BADLY WOUNDED

One man killed, another mortally wounded and a third slightly wounded is the result of a shooting affray at Marcola about 2:30 this afternoon. The affair was between Charles Crowley and Bert Nunn, who met at Price & Weber's store and emptied their revolvers at each other. Crowley died soon after receiving his wounds and Nunn is said to be in a very serious condition. A man named

respectable citizen, a man of family, formerly residing at Goshen and Springfield, and has been working at one of the logging camps at Marcola for some time past. It is said that Crowley made threats against Nunn several times during the day, and while they were on their way from Eugene to Marcola this afternoon.

Nunn was shot through the abdomen and it is probable that he will not recover from his wounds. It could not be learned over the telephone this afternoon how many shots entered his body, nor where the shots fired by Nunn entered the body of Crowley. Immediately after the shooting Sheriff Fred Fisk, Deputy Prosecuting Attorney G. F. Skipworth and Coroner W. T. Gordon were notified. It was first reported that Crowley had not been killed but afterward it

FIVE KILLED IN TRAIN WRECK ON SANTA FE

WILD CARS OF FREIGHT TRAIN RUSH DOWN STEEP GRADE AND CRASH INTO TWO ENGINES AT STATION—THREE RAILROAD TRAINMEN AND TWO THAMPS KNOWN TO BE DEAD

San Bernardino, Cal., Sept. 21.—In a collision on the Cajon grade on the Santa Fe railroad at 4:20 this morning five men were killed and one fatally hurt. The cars of a long freight train got away and rushed down the grade near Devers station, crashing into two engines standing on the track. Engineer Statton was killed and brakemen Ray and Bryant burned to death in the wreckage, which took fire. Two trainmen were also burned to death. The wreckage is still burning and there may be other victims in the wreck. Fireman Thresher suffered a fractured skull and will probably die. The scene of the wreck is nine miles east of here.

PROBING CHARGES AGAINST OFFICIAL IN OPEN COURT

Holse, Sept. 21.—Federal Judge William today began an investigation in open court into the conduct of United States Attorney Ruick, who secured the indictment against United States Senator Borah and several others for alleged conspiracy to defraud the government in securing various timber lands. Ruick, it is alleged, practically coerced the grand jury into filing the indictments. The pleas were supported by three affidavits of three members of the old grand jury and denied in also affidavits filed in behalf of Ruick. A special grand jury is also investigating the charges of alleged misconduct on the part of Ruick. Senator Borah has not entered any plea of a technical nature, but a decision adverse to the government in the other cases may affect Borah's trial, which is scheduled to begin on Monday.

DISAFFECTION IS GROWING AMONG CHINESE MASSES

Hong Kong, Sept. 21.—The imperial troops repulsed an attack made on the city of Yochow on the Yangtze River by two thousand rebels, who stormed the walls and scaled the walls, but after sharp fighting were driven off. The disaffection in the Kiangchow district is spreading, owing to the increased taxation and the high price of foodstuffs.

THREE MINERS KILLED AND FIVE INJURED

Wilkesbarre, Sept. 21.—By an explosion of gas in one of the mines of the Lehigh & Wilkesbarre Coal Company in South Wilkesbarre today, three were killed and five injured.
