COURSE AT THE UNIVERSITY

ESTABLISHED FOR ESPECIAL
BENEFIT OF TEACHERS—
GLEE CLUB WILL MAKE EAST-
ERN OREGON TOUR—FIRST AN-

The University of Oregon announces that during the year 1907-08 correspondence courses for the especial benefit of teachers. In the future it is the intention of the faculty to enlarge the scope of the work, until every department is doing correspondence work.

There are five courses offered, two of which may go as college courses, and for which credit will be given.

The courses are English classics (state high school course), Shakespeare, and his writings, history of England, pedagogy and algebra. In pedagogy and Shakespeare college credit is extended to those who complete the work. In the others units for entrance credits may be given.

The only cost to the applicant is his books and the postage, the university supplying directions and lists. Moreover, the traveling libraries of the state library commission are put at the student's command for a limited time, and he is given very valuable privileges.

The credit that is given for each

course is as follows:
 English classics, five entrance credits or one unit; English history, five entrance credits or one unit; algebra, five credits or one unit; Shakespeare, three college credits; pedagogy, three college credits.

What the status of the University of Oregon football team will be at the close of the 1907 season is a thing which the student body is guessing at, not without some worry.

The past week has shown but little what the men can do, for the reason that the players are unusually slow in getting out, and that nothing but preliminary work has been done. Moreover, the students are inclined to judge the new candidates a little harshly, having in mind at all times the standard set by last year's graduates. But because Coach Frost has until October 19 to select and develop his team, there is no reason for discouragement yet.

Perrie, a sub-center on the W. S. C. team of last year, is a promising man for that position, who is working consistently. He is heavy and short, with fair action. There are also a couple of other men, who might go in there, Ray, who weighs 200 pounds, and Hildebrand, a Roseburg boy. Oregon found out last year that centre was a critical point in the team, for it took a long time for

any one but Hug to learn to pass satisfactorily.

For the ends there is considerable material. Captain Moores is very light this year, but three weeks should see him in normal shape. Coleman is also a good candidate, being fast and very stockily built. Taylor, of H. M. A. note, make make a crackerjack at either half or end.

Behind the line there is nothing definite. "Dud" Clarke is showing up in good form, weighing 185 pounds stripped upon his arrival. Zacharias is also in good condition. Moulton, if he plays, will make a crack tackle or guard. Last year he played defensive end, breaking the interference. The pivotal point of quarter is likely to fall into the hands of Kuykendall, though Billy Woods is out in good shape.

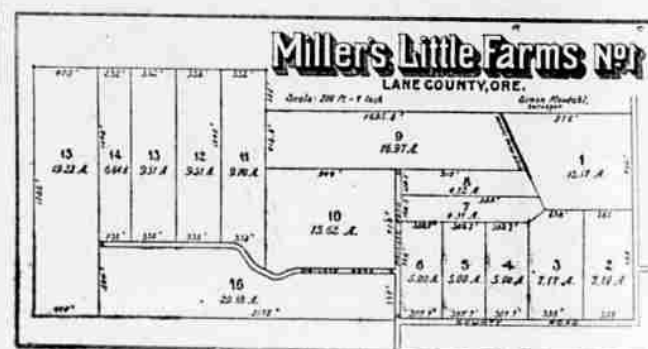
Hathaway and Sharkey Huston will not try for the team, the rule that one man can only enter two athletic sports keeping them out of the game. Both stood good chances to make the eleven.

Second team men and substitutes who have shown and stand good chances of the first eleven are Oberhauser, who is heavier than ever before, Grout and Kilpatrick, 175-pounders from LaGrande, "Mike" Walker, a former O. A. C. player, is being tried one behind the line.

Two Oregon games will be played in Portland, the first with the University of Idaho at noon, on October 26, and the annual game with Multnomah, and two in Eugene, the one with Pacific October 19, and the one with O. A. C. November 9. Nearly every team in the Northwest is a puzzle as to strength, and Oregon faces the very worst of them this season.

The game with Pullman will not be played under any conditions, for the reason that Washington University

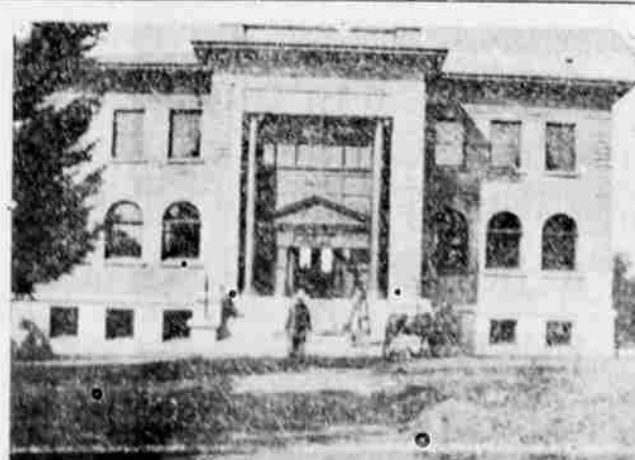
Other Notes.
