NEW PLAN OF HANDLING STUDENT BODY FUNDS

EVERY BILL WILL PASS THROUGH STUDENT BODY TREASURER, REGISTERED FAN—ANOTHER JOAN WILL BE MADE FOR BENEFIT OF NEEDY STUDENTS

A new plan has been evolved this year for the handling of the student body funds for every department and especially for athletics. Every bill outside of a few incidental traveling expenses will be paid through the student body treasurer, Registrar Tiffany. Such a result, be impossible in the future.

The money received will at once be turned over to the treasurer, and when the bills are presented, vouches for by the manager, the treasurer is authorized to pay them. In this way the managers will have nothing to do with the handling of the money, immediately after the gate receipts are collected.

For handling the fund the treasurer receives three per cent of the total, and of course is made responsible. This year the student body fund should amount to nearly two thousand dollars. Backing is given to the publications, athletic enterprises and various other things, as Glee Club and debate and oratory.

Loan Fund for Poor Students. Announcement has been made that another loan fund will be made this winter for the benefit of poor students. The donor and amount is withheld for the present, but the sum is assured.

There is at present a fund of \$261.60, contributed by various individuals and the class of 1905, which contributed \$100.

Sixteen students have taken out loans from the fund amounting to \$569.65, and at the present time all is loaned but a few dollars. None of the money has ever been lost.

Briefly the plan is to loan to students who must have money to continue or begin their courses, the amount to be paid back after they are through the university.

Six per cent interest is charged, and no set time is provided for repayment. As the money is repaid it is loaned over again, thus making the capital capable of an indefinite amount of good. Where the sum is considerable, the borrower is supposed to insure his life.

The good that such a fund may do is incalculable, and one man, whose name is withheld, gives sums every year toward increasing the amount. When the amount by the interest and gifts becomes greater, it will be possible for almost any needy student to go through college.

The future and simply intend to win the land in the present. For instance the small sheep farmer who has a home and wishes that home to pass to his children improved in value will naturally run his flock so that the land will support it, not only today, but ten years hence; but a big absentee sheep owner, who has no home on the land at all, but simply owns huge migratory flocks of sheep, may well find it to his profit to drive them over the small sheep farmer's range and eat it all out. He can then drive his flocks on, whereas the small man cannot. Of course, to permit such a state of things is not only evil for the small man, but is destructive of the best interests of the country. Substantially the same conditions obtain as regards cattle. The custom has therefore grown up of fencing great tracts of government land without warrant of law. The men who fence this land were sometimes rich men who by fencing it kept out actual settlers, and thereby worked evil to the country. But in many cases, whether they were large men or small men their object was not to keep out actual settlers, but to protect themselves and their own industry by preventing overgrazing of the range on the part of reckless stock owners who had no place in the permanent development of the country and who were indifferent to everything except the profits of the moment. To permit this land to be used in this illegal fencing inevitably leads to very grave abuses, and the government has therefore forced the fencees to take down their fences. In doing this we have not only obeyed and enforced the law, but we have corrected many flagrant abuses.
