TRAIN RUNS OVER

BRAKEMAN'S LEG

Guard Special Service.

Cottage Grove, Or., Oct. 1.—Bert
Willard, a freight brakeman, being
a member of one of the best families
here, was run over by a locomotive
at Roseburg and it was necessary
to amputate one of his feet above
the ankle. He passed through here
last evening on the flyer on his way
to Portland, where he will be cared
for at a hospital.

The Roseburg Review of yesterday
tells of the accident as follows:

A. J. Willard, a freight brakeman
running between here and Junction,
suffered the loss of his right foot
in the Roseburg railroad yards late
this afternoon. He had just come in
from his run on train No. 225, and
was standing near the front of his
train watching for a signal from the
rear brakeman, when an engine
coming from the round house struck
him as he stood beside the track on
which it approached unseen by him.
He was thrown with his right foot
upon the rail and it was almost com-
pletely severed at the ankle. He
was taken at once to the local emer-
gency hospital where Drs. Hoover
and Seelye amputated the foot and
the young man was placed on board
the flyer en route to a hospital in
Portland.
