PUBLIC SCHOOL PUPILS STILL COMING IN

One hundred and one new pupils registered at the public schools yesterday and a good many registered today, the figures for today's enrollment not being obtainable until evening. Including yesterday's enrollment, the total number of pupils registered since the opening day is 1239, which is nearly 300 greater than at the corresponding period last year, although exact figures of last year are not at hand. The enrollment at the several schools up to last evening was as follows: Geary, 306; Central, 364; Patterson, 298; high, 271. An overflow room is being organized, and it is probable that two will have to be fitted up. The additional rooms are in the basement of the high school building.
